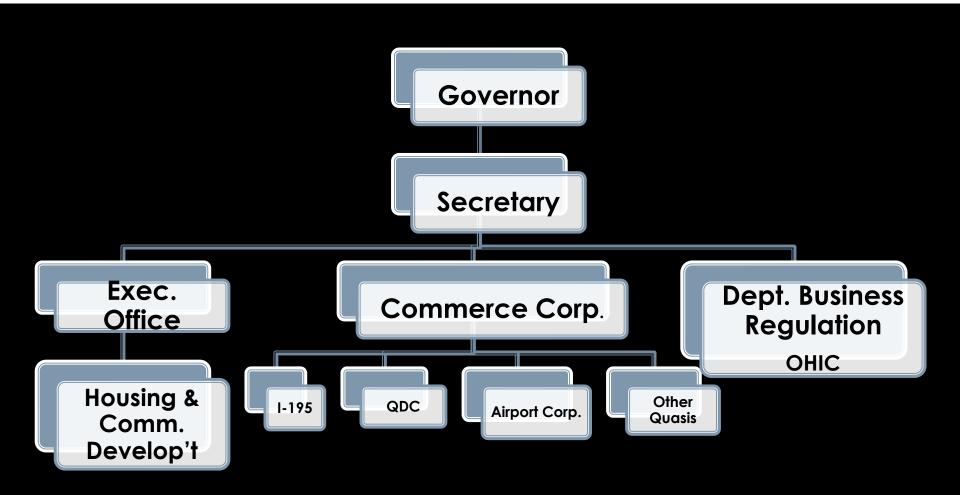
Introduction

- 2013 Assembly created Executive
 Office of Commerce
 - Oversee and serve as the lead agency of the executive branch for managing the promotion of commerce and the state's economy
 - Administered by a Secretary of Commerce
 - Statutes effective February 1, 2015

Introduction

- 2013 Legislation included power to operate Department of Business Regulation functions
 - Governor's FY 2016 recommendation maintained as stand-alone agency
 - Department falls under Secretary and Executive Office
 - Office of the Health Insurance Commissioner located within the Department of Business

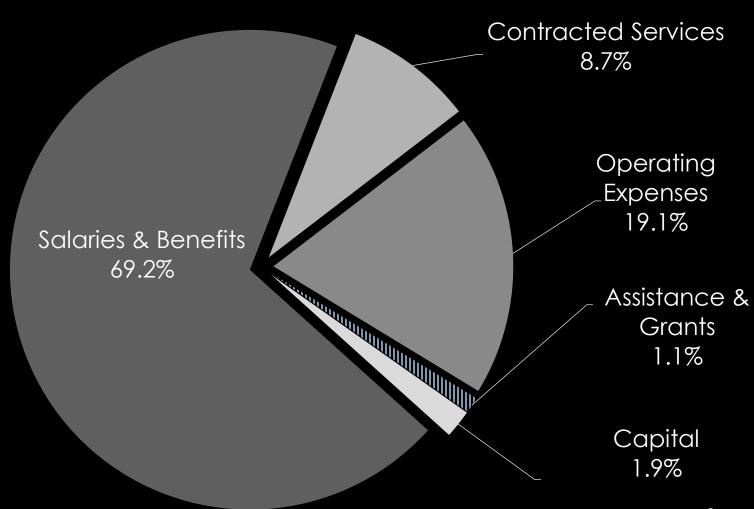
- 2017 Assembly authorized establishment of internal service funds for centralized services

Target Issues

- Department provided with general revenue target of \$17.2 million
 - Includes current service adjustments totaling \$0.6 million & 5.0 % reduction or \$0.8 million
- Budget submitted proposed savings of \$54,500 & enhanced revenue collections of \$0.8 million
 - Governor's recommendation \$0.5 million more than current service

Enacted Staffing Summary

- 2018 Assembly enacted 161.0 positions
 - 9.0 fewer than the Governor recommended
 - Business Regulation 148.0 FTE
 - 60.0 more positions than FY 2018 enacted
 - Transfer of building related functions from other agencies
 - Office of the Health Insurance
 Commissioner 13.0 FTE

Statewide Savings Initiatives

- Governor distributes statewide general revenue savings enacted for FY 2019 in the Department of Administration
 - Prompt Payment \$0.4 million
 - Vendors voluntarily offer a discount if payments are received within an agreed upon date
 - Contracts \$3.0 million
 - Effort to reduce costs of certain commodities
 - Food, maintenance, office equipment, telecommunications
 - Insurance \$0.5 million
 - Reductions in policies for property & crime

Office of the Health Insurance Commissioner

- Created by 2004 Assembly within the Department of Business Regulation
 - Established as a distinct program in FY 2012
- Positions funded through a variety of sources
 - 6.0 positions funded by general revenues
 - 5.5 positions federally funded from 3 grants
 - One grant closes during FY 2020; Office seeking an extension
 - 1.5 positions funded from restricted receipts

Office of the Health Insurance Commissioner – Gen. Rev.

- OHIC sets and enforces standards
 - Consumer protection, service provider fairness, insurer solvency, health system improvement
- 6.0 general revenue funded positions
 - \$1.2 million, \$0.1 million more than enacted to reflect current staffing
- \$0.2 million for office operations
 - \$12,084 less than enacted, after accounting for statewide savings

Office of the Health Insurance Commissioner – Federal Grants

- State Innovation Models:
 - Design or test innovative health care payment and service delivery models
 - FY 2020 includes funding equivalent to roughly 1 pay period as the grant funds exhaust
 - Office has applied for a no-cost extension; an approval would continue to fund commitments

Office of the Health Insurance Commissioner – Federal Grants

- Health Insurance Enforcement Grant
 - Implement & enhance policy form review, conduct market examinations & analysis, & investigate complaints
 - FY 2020 \$56,060 less from federal funds
 - Reflect end of extension; positions transition to different federal source through 2-year period
 - FY 2019 \$0.3 million more than enacted to reflect 1-year no-cost extension
 - Adds \$12,300 more for constituent management system shared with Utilization Review

Office of the Health Insurance Commissioner – Federal Grants

- New State Flexibility Grant
 - To increase state role to enhance and implement federal market reforms and consumer protections
 - FY 2020 \$0.2 million from federal funds
 - Supports 1.5 positions and operating costs
 - Conduct a market scan of the 4 major insurance carriers
 - Analyze interstate benchmark plans & explore new affordable options
 - Oversight of adherence to existing renewable coverage requirements

Office of the Health Insurance Commissioner - Restricted

- Health Care Utilization Review
 - Administer certification, investigate complaints & compliance of state laws, rules & regulations
 - FY 2020 3.0 positions & \$0.5 million restricted receipts
 - 1.0 position and \$0.2 million more than enacted
 - Related supervisory time as reported at closing, percentage charged increases from FY 2019 & FY 2020
 - \$25,000 for FY 2019 constituent management system shared with enforcement grant

Office of the Health Insurance Commissioner – RI REACH

- Office's consumer assistance program,
 - Toll-free live answer helpline; operated by the Rhode Island Parent Information Network
 - Funding: FY 2014 FY 2016 through federal rate review funds; FY 2017 general revenues
 - 2018 Assembly approved Medicaid reimbursements based on call volume beginning FY 2018
- Budget includes \$0.5 million
 - \$30,000 more from federal Medicaid match funds

- 2018 Assembly established the new division
- Consolidates licensing and regulation relating to building and construction design, inspection, and enforcement of building and fire codes
 - Includes Contractors' Registration & Licensing Board, State Building Code Commission, Fire Safety Board of Appeal and Review, & State Fire Marshal

- Enacted budget
 - \$8.0 million from all sources 62.0 FTE
 - Savings from charging design professionals expenses to Contractors' Registration & Licensing Board restricted receipts
 - Staff noted at the time expenses may exceed projected revenues
 - Administration indicated it would seek administrative efficiencies to reduce expenses

- Gov. FY 2020 \$8.1 million all sources
 - Adds \$0.1 million gen. rev. for hazardous materials detection equipment
 - \$0.3 million from RICAP for Fire Academy
 - Converts vacant FTE to a Deputy Director
 - Funded from restricted receipts
 - \$0.1 million annually; position filled since Sept.
- FY 2019 Revised budget
 - Shifts a position to Central Management
 - Restricted receipts online licensing \$21,000

- New Streamline & Simplify initiative
 - Jointly with EOC to improve various licensing requirements which impact businesses
 - Support State & Local Partnership Council & Site Readiness implementation
- Adds \$0.5 million & 8.0 FTE positions
 - 1.0 for Small Business Ombudsman from OMB
 - Funded by Commerce Corporation
 - 4.0 fully funded for FY 2020
 - 3.0 not funded unclear plan for filling all and out year impact

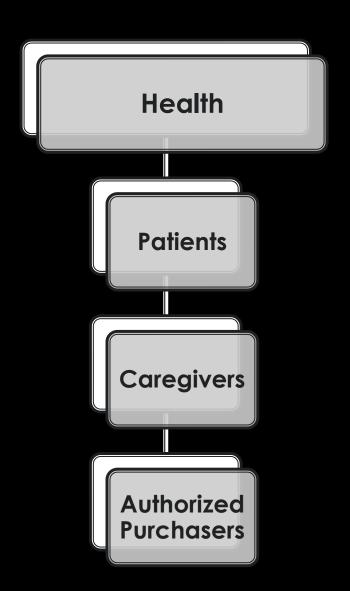
Office of Cannabis Regulation

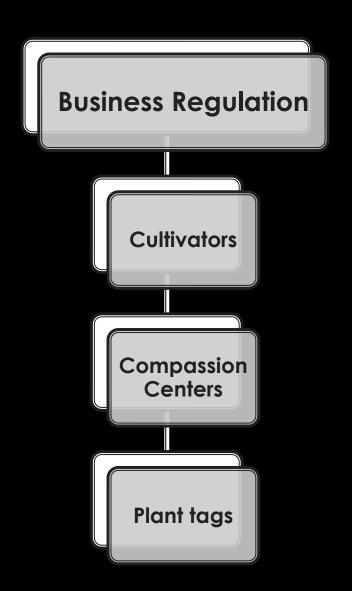
- New Office of Cannabis Regulation
 - FY 2020 Recommendation includes \$5.5 million from restricted receipts
 - Recommendation shifts existing Medical Marijuana Licensing
 - Includes 5.0 positions with staffing costs of \$0.6 million & 0.6 million of operations
 - Adds 17.0 new positions for adult regulation
 - Includes \$1.9 million for staffing & \$2.5 million for operations

Article 20 – Centralization

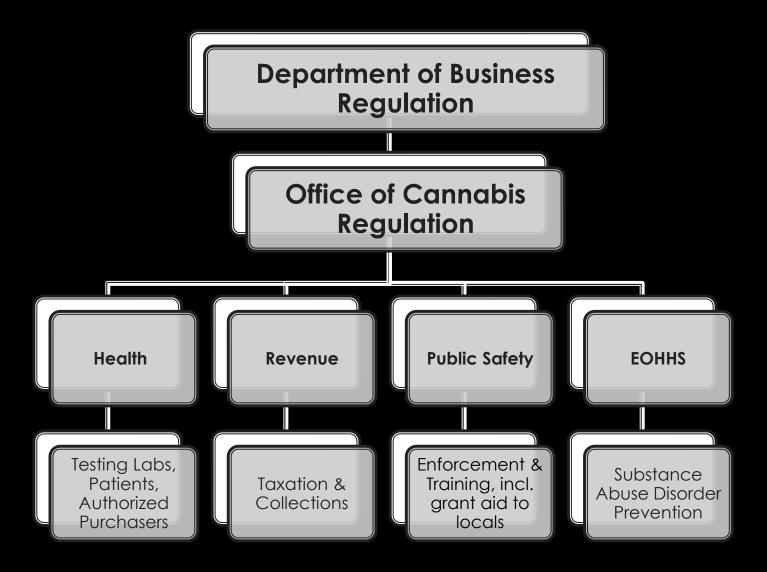
- Establishes a new Office of Cannabis Regulation within the Department of Business Regulation
 - Provide oversight & coordination of all agency implementation, regulation, including strategic policy response
 - Providing guidance to municipalities
 - Report to officials the estimated projected revenues & distribution funds which assist in the oversight and regulation of all marijuana

Article 20 – Centralization

Powers				
Subject to Discretion	To Issue any license type, including future industry to support the market (online sale, delivery, etc), permit a medical licensees' adult use activities if no risk to medical activity			
Subject to Limitations	Number of industries licenses, production volume, potency level, number of licenses held by an entity

Article 20 – Centralization

- Office of Cannabis Regulation with Department of Health to establish
 - Standards for laboratory proficiency, quality control, test standardization & round robin testing
 - Produce additional laboratory licenses pursuant to these standards
 - Annual license fees & related employee registration cards subject to the discretion of the Department of Health
 - Phase-in of laboratory testing requirements if the market lacks necessary capacity
 - 1 laboratory in process for approval

Article 20 - Enforcement

- Codifies DBR's areas of regulation and authority
 - Transportation/Delivery
 - Seizure/Destruction
 - Security requirements
 - Including use of a seed to sale tracking system
 - Marketing & Advertising practices
 - Extends grounds for registry card denial for caregivers & purchasers to prior violations
 - Currently only incomplete/falsified information

Article 20 - Enforcement

- Establishes fines for Compassion Centers
 - No threat to public health/safety \$500
 - Threat to public health/safety \$2,000
 - No collections assumed in budget
- Provides authority for show cause/ cease and desist orders for any program violation of a licensed activity
 - Decisions stand until Superior Court ruling

Article 20 – Fiscal Impact

- Municipalities
 - May not ban activity by regular business
 - Zoning compliant to Office regulation
 - By referendum; entities by separate question
 - Election by Nov. 5, 2019; authority in place by Jan. 1, 2020
 - May not prohibit existing medical operations

Central Management

- Administers & oversees the statutory functions of the department
 - Support services: budgeting, personnel, legal & information technology
 - Excluding OHIC
 - FY 2020 includes \$0.3 million for 2.0 positions for FTE shifted from other divisions
 - Fiscal support for Building Professionals shifted from that division
 - Legislative and PR FTE repurposed from Banking division vacancy

Banking Regulation

- Monitors, regulates and examines financial institutions
 - Required by statute to conduct examinations of banks & credit unions every 18 months
 - The Governor's recommendations reflect savings consistent with the reduced level of staffing

Securities Regulation

- Enforces compliance with state laws for the securities industry, franchises, charities, fundraisers and time-shares
 - Licenses and regulates securities professionals
 - Increase reflects reallocation of salaries previously charged to Commercial Licensing

Insurance Regulation

- Conducts financial examinations of domestic insurance companies
 - Licenses foreign insurers and other financial companies, and over 120,000 producers, adjusters and appraisers
 - FY 2020 recommendation reflects current staffing levels
- Actuarial services for rate filings
 - Avg. 3-year expenditure is \$1.1 million
 - Billed to the regulated corporations

Commercial Licensing, Gaming & Athletics

- Licenses & regulates real estate professionals, automotive, liquor, & medical marijuana industries, & casino employees & vendors
 - Adds \$48,000 of new restricted receipts in both years
 - Pursuant to Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform Act
 - Article 2 of budget authorizes a new restricted account to carry this out

Comm. Licensing, Gaming & Athletics – Medical Marijuana

- Governor recommends \$1.2 million for FY 2019 revised
- \$0.5 million for salaries and benefits
 - \$0.1 million more from restricted receipts to fund 1.0 new position
 - Operations as enacted
- Transfers funding and staff to the Office of Cannabis Regulation for FY 2020

Board of Accountancy

- Autonomous board responsible for administration of licensing
 - Certified public accountants
 - Public accountants
 - Accountancy partnerships & corporations
- Governor recommends \$5,887
 - Primarily National Assoc. of State Boards of Accountancy Membership
 - Administrative expenses & hearing support

Department of Business Regulation

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
