Veterans' Services – Home

- Veterans' Home funding is derived from 4 sources
 - Resident contributions
 - General Revenues
 - Restricted Receipts
 - Other general revenues / state funds
 - Federal per diem rate towards cost of care
 - Federal reimbursement for construction projects

Veterans' Services – Home

- Federal reimbursement for each resident based on their level of care
- Per diems for federal FY 2021
 - Dormitory: \$49.91 (\$18,217)
 - Skilled Nursing: \$115.62 (\$42,201)
 - 70% or higher VA disability pension: \$466.00 (\$170,090)
 - These rates are set annually in October

Staffing

- Governor adds 11.0 FTE positions for Veterans' Home in FY 2022
 - Removes 11.0 vacant positions from DHS
 - Adds authorization for nursing staff at the Home
 - 8.0 CNAs & 3.0 Nurses
 - Additional nursing staff would reduce total need for pooled nurses

Veterans' Home Census

- Prior to COVID-19, facility was nearly at capacity
 - 208 bed maximum- nursing home & domiciliary
 - Admission paused because of COVID
 - DOH guidance
- Admission resumed in April 2021
 - 141 residents on May 17
 - 140 nursing home, 1 domiciliary
 - Lowest census was 132 residents on March 28
 - 131 nursing home, 1 domiciliary

COVID-19 Relief

- Lower census means lower federal per diem reimbursement & maintenance fee collections
 - Enacted budget reflects OVS Oct. estimates
 - Assumed average census of 160 residents
- COVID- 19 funding
 - Enacted budget shifted \$11.8 million of staff costs to Coronavirus Relief funds
 - Governor provides additional \$0.3 million for overtime in FY 2021, total \$12.1 million

COVID-19 Relief

- Governor adds FEMA funding for cleaning expenses, PPE & contracted medical staff
 - \$2.5 million for FY 2021
 - \$2.3 million for FY 2022
 - Governor requested amendment to reduce funding to \$1.1 million based on anticipated expenses

Maintenance Fees

- FY 2020 closing included \$5.0 million to repay certain residents
 - Maintenance fees collected from February 2013 though May 2020 from residents with 70% or greater service related disability
 - All expenses are already accounted for in FY 2020 closing
- As of May 7, \$3.6 million paid
 - 31 refunds completed & 22 pending
 - Delays result from probate process
 - 4 next-of-kin have not been identified

Veterans' Home Capital

- Asset protection project for Home
 - Began in FY 2020
 - Maintain lifespan of new building
 - Managed by DCAMM
 - Enacted budget does not include funding
 - Based on Governor recommendation
 - FY 2022 recommendation includes \$350,000 from RICAP
