Virtual Meetings

- A 33-member group created by state law in 1987 to develop and coordinate a system of health care and social supports for older Rhode Islanders and persons with disabilities who need long term supports and services. Members include legislators, state agency representatives, long term service providers, health care workers, community agencies and advocates.
- Recommends and promotes policies, legislation and funding. <u>Examples:</u> state LTC ombudsman + home care client rights laws, funding for caregiver supports/respite, rebalance LTC spending, home/community service expansion, criminal Background checks for long term care workers, enhanced Information, Referral and Assessments.









- Long Term Care is any type of help that someone receives over a long period of time to allow them to eat, walk, bathe, get dressed, move about their home, and perform other necessary daily tasks
- Long-term services and supports encompasses the broad range of paid and unpaid medical and personal care assistance that people may need for several weeks, months, or years when they experience difficulty completing self-care tasks as a result of aging, chronic illness, or disability.
- ADL's Activities of Daily Living to include eating, bathing, getting dressed, mobility, toileting, continence
- IADL's Instrumental Activities of Daily Living such as managing finances, handling transportation, shopping, preparing meals, using the telephone or other communication devices, managing medications, doing laundry, housework, and basic home maintenance








LTSS EXPENDITURES


Nursing Facility & Home/Community Spending





Continued Advocacy for Strategic Actions for Elder Economic Security

- Address Economic Insecurity of Many Low-Income Older Adults/PWD
 - Expand Office of Healthy Aging @Home Cost Share Program \$842,137 in Gov. McKee budget for this program expansion; H5115 by Rep. Solomon + S162 by Sen. Felag will Increase income eligibility to 250% FPL and extends to under age 65 with dementia.
 - Increase eligibility for Medicare Savings Program which pays for Part B (\$148.50/month) many older adults face \$5,000-\$6,000 in out of pocket costs.
 H5542 by Rep. Ajello and S481 by Sen. Cano. Would extend eligibility to 185%FPL and remove asset limits.
 - Raise income eligibility for Medicaid for persons age 65+ and those with disabilities to 133%FPL to be equitable with Expansion populations. H5790 by Tanzsi and S492 by Cano.
 - H5681 by Rep. Ruggiero and S480 by Sen. Coyne. Increases maximum credit for state Property Tax Relief program to \$750 and expands eligibility to persons with income up to \$40,000. Program not modified since 2006.

Workforce Issues

• Need to set Living Wage for Direct Care Staff across LTSS providers to assist persons needing help to remain at home -- \$15/Hour. S271 by Sen. DiPalma
