
Dear Chair Solomon and distinguished Members of the House Corporations Committee,

On behalf of the New England Connectivity and Telecommunications Association (NECTA), I appreciate the opportunity to submit testimony on House Bill No. 7173, relating to critical infrastructure.

House Bill 7173 would expand protections and penalties for vandalism and theft of critical infrastructure to include broadband, internet and wireless property. As telecommunications networks are essential to public safety and economic infrastructure, damage to facilities and property can disrupt emergency services, shut down businesses, and isolate communities. A single fiber cut can knock out service to thousands of residents, businesses, schools, and hospitals. Understanding the devastating impact of vandalism on telecommunications networks, NECTA supports the goals of this bill to strengthen state penalties and safeguards. Further, to ensure that all forms of telecommunications property is accounted for and protected, NECTA respectfully requests that the Committee amend the bill to include “cable” among the other communications technologies included in the bill.
