My name is Angel Lopez. I am an unofficial advocate for Providence, and I attest my biometric information is not for sale. I write to you today in opposition to House Bill 7781. The bill as written will allow the creation of an application mentioned on page 2 lines 19 & 20, that when filed with a competent court and competent jurisdiction may deny a parent access and review of their own child's medical records. Referring to medical records that originate within a Public School in this state and include DNA & other types of biometric information for the purpose of creating a record to be stored and shared.

I refer you all to Title 20 of the US Code Chapter 31 Titled General Provisions Concerning Education. Section 1232g states that no funding will be made available to any educational institution that shares the information of minors without parental consent. The legislation in question this evening will supersede federal law with the creation of a mechanism that aims to coerce consent from parents all over this state that depend on Public Education.

To make things worse, lines 30 to 34 on page 2 describe circumstances where students in Public Schools will be recorded via video or audio during normal education and extracurricular activities that occur on school grounds. There are purposefully no redlines, hard stops or recommendations included in the language of this bill to limit the recordings because that clarity will be decided by the school districts. The recordings will be

considered education records according to the federal law I mentioned previously. As a

product of the Providence School system and an Alumni of Boston College, the intentions

behind this bill are repulsive. To support my perspective, there are two separate clauses

that clarify that this legislation is not intended to imply or apply to "a parental action or

decision that would end life." The clause can be found on page 3 line 10 and again on line

House Education Committee, I ask all of you to stop House Bill 7781. It is 2024, an election

year, and we should not be discussing psychological control over students sugar coated

with the phrase Parents Bill of Rights. Federal, State, and Municipal funds should be spent

on building healthy educational facilities and programs that develop and prepare the youth

to tackle the challenges our communities will face tomorrow.
