Dear Chairman Abney and members of the Committee,

Care New England (CNE) appreciates the opportunity to testify on H 5320 and we would like to thank Chairman Casey for his efforts addressing the challenges our providers and patients face in the behavioral healthcare arena.

The legislative changes proposed in H 5320 are particularly beneficial for individuals with conditions such as bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, or schizotypal disorder, as it enables them to receive timely and uninterrupted access to essential medications. Because of this, CNE is supportive of H 5320. By removing administrative barriers, this bill aims to streamline the treatment process, allowing healthcare providers like The Providence Center and Butler Hospital to prescribe the most effective medications without delays. This approach not only improves clinical outcomes but also supports patient autonomy and continuity of care.

Enhancing access to behavioral healthcare by eliminating prior authorization and step therapy for nonpreferred anticonvulsant and antipsychotic medications is crucial because it reduces delays in treatment and ensures patients receive the most effective medication for their specific needs. These administrative barriers can interrupt continuity of care, particularly for individuals with serious mental health conditions like schizophrenia or bipolar disorder, where medication stability is essential to avoid relapse or hospitalization. By allowing providers to prescribe based on clinical judgment rather than insurance protocols, patients are more likely to experience better outcomes, improved adherence, and a higher quality of life.
