My name is William, I live in Warwick, and I am writing in strong support of Representative Alzate's bill H6020, which allocates \$32.6 million to address the Rhode Island Public Transit Authority's (RIPTA) budget deficit. RIPTA is currently facing a critical deficit of \$32.6 million dollars. This financial challenge is not a sudden occurrence but rather the result of years of underfunding and undervaluing a transit system that is absolutely vital to so many Rhode Islanders.

As a resident of Warwick who works in Providence, RIPTA is an indispensable part of my daily life.
