Re: CLF **Supports** House Bill No. 8298 – 2026 Bond Referenda

Dear Chair Abney:

The Conservation Law Foundation (“CLF”) appreciates the opportunity to comment on House Bill No. 8298, which would place a ballot question before voters in November authorizing the state to issue \$25 million in bonds to support implementation of the state's Bicycle Mobility Plan. We offer our enthusiastic support for this bill.

CLF is a member-supported non-profit advocacy organization working to protect public health and the environment and build healthy communities in Rhode Island and throughout New England. CLF supports policies that increase viable green transportation and help to achieve the greenhouse gas emissions reduction mandates of the Act on Climate.

H-8298 would give Rhode Islanders the option of funding capital investments into the 2020 Bicycle Mobility Plan, which would provide seamless transportation and recreation links for bikers across the state and decrease carbon emissions.¹ This data-driven plan, which has already been adopted by the state, is a necessary investment into our environment, economy, and public health.

Rhode Island is well situated for investments in bike infrastructure. More than half of all trips taken by Rhode Islanders are under three miles, and nearly a third are less than a mile. Short trips are great for travelling by bike, but we need to have the infrastructure for it to be safe and viable.

According to Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management’s published Greenhouse Gas Emissions Inventory, Rhode Island’s transportation sector accounts for over a third of Rhode Island’s greenhouse gas emissions.² That is untenable. The Act on Climate, which sets

enforceable climate emissions reduction requirements, mandates that Rhode Island achieve net-zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050.³ More bikes safely replacing cars on the road would help the state achieve this mandate, while having the added benefit of reducing traffic congestion.

CLF urges the General Assembly to add this project to the ballot this fall. It is not just an investment in safe bicycle and pedestrian networks – it is an investment in the health and wellbeing of Rhode Island and its residents. We therefore ask that you support House Bill No. 8298.
