It ensures that children who are deaf or hard of hearing have equitable access to the education and support they need to thrive. Every child deserves the opportunity to reach their full potential, regardless of hearing ability.

Equally important is the need for stable, consistent funding from year to year. Ongoing uncertainty creates unnecessary stress for families and school districts, making it difficult to plan for student placement and continuity of services. Children benefit from stability, and programs like RIAOP need reliable funding to continue delivering high-quality support without interruption.

Establishing a funding model like that of the Rhode Island School for the Deaf is a matter of equity. Students with hearing loss deserve access to a full range of educational options that meet their individual needs, and RIAOP is a critical part of that continuum.

I respectfully urge you to support this legislation and help ensure that the Rhode Island Auditory Oral Program can continue its vital work for years to come. This is an investment in children, families, and the future of our state.
