Re: Support for Governor's Supplemental Request to Amend FY22 Appropriations Act

Dear Chair Abney and House Finance Committee Members:

We are a multi-sector coalition of organizations writing in strong support of Governor McKee's Supplemental Request to Amend the FY22 Appropriations Act, including a \$29.5 million initial investment in housing affordability and security with American Rescue Plan (ARP) State Fiscal Recovery Funds. We appreciate the Governor's request to invest ten percent of ARP funds in affordable homes, child care, small businesses, and expanding broadband access. Investing in these inter-connected sectors now is critical to Rhode Islanders' economic recovery.

As we know, the COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated housing insecurity, especially for low-income families and Black, Indigenous, and People of Color. According to the RI Coalition to End Homelessness, over the past month, nearly 600 people were sleeping outdoors or in places not fit for human habitation. Our rental vacancy rate is the lowest it has been in a long time, around two percent. For the past several years, data from HousingWorks RI have shown over one third of Rhode Island households – approximately 140,000 – are cost-burdened. Our lowest-paid workers, many of whom have been deemed "essential" during the pandemic, must work at least 80 hours every week, 52 weeks a year (the equivalent of two full-time 40/hour week jobs with no days off all year long), to afford a moderately priced apartment at fair-market rent. The sooner funds for housing are deployed, the sooner these conditions Rhode Islanders are experiencing can be addressed.

The Governor's housing proposal includes funds for development and preservation (\$15M) and site acquisition (\$12M) for affordable homes, housing stability services (\$1.5M), administrative staffing at the Office of Housing and Community Development (\$500K), and broadband expansion (\$500K). This represents an important step in meeting the housing needs of constituents. However, decades of disinvestment in the production of affordable homes and supportive and operational services necessary for people to remain stably housed have put our state in a position where a substantial, catalytic investment is needed.

We have an opportunity to make this generational down-payment on Rhode Island's future with an additional investment of \$525 million of ARP funds. We have proposed \$25M for immediate,

emergency needs for those experiencing homelessness and currently unsheltered or living in places not fit for human habitation; and \$500M to produce, preserve, and protect 2,500 affordable homes by 2030 (\$350 million), promote housing access and stability (\$60 million), and support communities to address issues associated with aging housing stock (\$90 million), to advance longer-term housing needs. We recently shared this proposal in a letter dated October 19, 2021 to Governor McKee and General Assembly leadership.

We realize that there is a difficult task ahead for state leaders in equitably allocating such a large amount of funds for connected priorities to benefit Rhode Islanders. In closing, we reiterate strong support for the Governor's Supplemental Request to Amend FY22 Appropriations Act and \$29.5 million for housing affordability, security, and broadband that is under consideration at today's hearing.

We urge the Committee to support this request and to please consider the need to allocate additional funds for safe, healthy, and affordable homes and housing stability as you make decisions in the coming months.
