Support for House Bill 6038 Re:

On behalf of our network of member agencies and SOAR, our taskforce of survivors, the Rhode Island Coalition Against Domestic Violence (RICADV) appreciates this opportunity to express our strong support for House Bill 6038. This legislation amends current law so that initial contraceptive prescriptions would no longer be limited to a 3-month supply, a restriction that complicates access and reduces consistency of contraceptive use.

Restricting any access to reproductive health services and choices places particularly dangerous burdens on victims of domestic and sexual violence. Victims of domestic violence are at a significantly higher risk for unintended pregnancy because partners who use violence will often sabotage or interfere with their partner's birth control in an attempt to exercise control over their reproductive decisions. In a 2010 study conducted jointly by the University of California-Davis School of Medicine and the Harvard School of Public Health, researchers found that at least 35% of domestic violence victims reported reproductive control by their abusive partner either by contraception interference or coercion to become pregnant. 1

Restrictions that complicate access to contraception provide additional leverage for people who use violence to threaten, trick, or intimidate their victims into continuing with an unwanted pregnancy. The legislature should act to ensure that all Rhode Islanders have reliable access to the reproductive health and contraception options they need. This will prevent unintended pregnancies by atrisk domestic violence victims who face additional danger when a pregnancy is added to a violent and abusive relationship.

Thank you for your consideration of this important legislation. We urge you to support House Bill 6038.
