RE: Support for H6117 Commercial Insurance Coverage for CHW Services

I write on behalf of the Washington County Coalition for Children in strong support of H6117 requiring commercial insurance plans to include coverage for all services provided by Community Health Workers.

Community Health Workers (CHWs) provide vital services, not only to individual patients, but to communities and health care systems as well. The role of CHWs is unique as they function at both the micro and macro levels to solve problems and improve the health of people as well as their communities. CHWs work in many capacities and in numerous sectors, including primary care, specialty medical care, behavioral health care, schools, social service agencies, community action agencies, food pantries, and more. CHWs, who are state certified, are trusted members of the community where they work, often sharing something in common with the people they serve (i.e. place, race, ethnicity, health condition, parent, etc.). CHWs serve as community ambassadors, facilitating needed services, improving the quality and cultural competence of service delivery, and connecting the dots in understanding that can spark needed community change. In a word, community health workers are AMAZING!

As vital as CHWs are, funding for these positions is tenuous at best. While the state has implemented a State Plan Amendment to allow CHWs to bill Medicaid for their services, most CHW positions are funded through federal and foundation grants. As a result, funding for these vital roles comes and goes. In fact, many of these grants have already been terminated and as a result we have lost a valuable part of the state's public health infrastructure that was so critical during the throws of the COVID 19 pandemic. H6117 will allow CHWs to bill for their micro-level work with individual patients, conducting health and promotion coaching, providing health education and training, facilitating health system navigation, as well as offering resource coordination services, care planning and follow-up care recommendations.

While this legislation will not provide all the funding needed to sustain CHW positions, commercial insurance reimbursement is part of the funding solution. I urge you to pass H6117.
