**H 7217 Position: Opposed**

**Re: H 7217 "Assault Weapon" Ban**

Dear Chair Craven and Members of the Judiciary Committee:

The National Shooting Sports Foundation ("NSSF") is the trade association for America's firearms, ammunition, hunting, and recreational shooting sports industry. Its mission is to promote, protect and preserve hunting and the shooting sports. NSSF has a membership of more than 9,000 manufacturers, distributors, firearms retailers, shooting ranges, and sportsmen's organizations. Our manufacturer members make the firearms used by law-abiding Rhode Island sportsmen, the U.S. military and law enforcement agencies throughout the state. This is to notify you of the opposition of NSSF to H 7217.

NSSF joins others in calling for a comprehensive approach that addresses many complex social issues, including school safety, preventing unauthorized firearms access, mental health, personal privacy, the popular media, and enforcing our existing laws while safeguarding constitutional rights.

Unfortunately though, H 7217 is an extremely expansive piece of legislation that does little to impact criminals and will only force law-abiding gun-owners and manufacturers to flee the state. This bill will do nothing to increase public safety and will have astronomical costs to the state to implement these far-reaching policies. The state will be spending millions upon millions of dollars to implement gun control policies that will give Rhode Island only the perception that they are tough on crime. This bans on firearms based on cosmetic appearance, complete registration of firearms, and even confiscation of legally owned firearms for someone who moves to the state, all policies that have proven to be flawed.

NSSF is a resource for much needed technical accuracy in this discussion. It is inaccurate, for example, to state that semiautomatic firearms have no lawful purpose. For well over 100 years, many millions of law-abiding citizens have owned and responsibly used semiautomatic rifles, pistols and shotguns for hunting, target shooting, collecting and personal protection. Semiautomatics are among the most popular hunting rifles, shotguns and target pistols. Currently, millions of law-abiding Americans responsibly own and safely use modern sporting rifles, which may resemble military firearms in appearance, but which function no differently from other types of semiautomatic firearms. Modern sporting rifles are commonly used for hunting, target shooting, home defense and collecting.

One only needs to look as far back as the 1994 "Assault Weapons" Ban to find legislation which did little to increase public safety. One of the sections of this law was halting the production of "high capacity" magazines. This gun control strategy soon proved to be a failure. A comprehensive study by the Centers for Disease Control looked at the full panoply of gun control measures, including this proposed magazine ban, and concluded that none could be proven to reduce crime. Another study, commissioned by Congress, found that bans were not effective since "the banned weapons and magazines were never used in more than a modest fraction of all gun murders." These studies only demonstrate a ban that did not work or increase public safety.

The problem, of course, with such laws is that criminals routinely ignore them (after all, they are criminals). Law-abiding citizens who have every right to purchase and own firearms are the ones who are suffering by eliminating aspects of their activities with this type of law. Many law enforcement individuals are in agreement when questioned on the necessity of more gun control laws. Their sentiments focus on the fact that we currently have enough laws and that these laws just need to be strictly enforced.

The firearms industry has contributed over \$320 million in economic activity to Rhode Island in 2022 and employs over 600 people in the state. The firearms industry is still one of the few industries that has continued to grow while also contributing tax revenues to the state (to the tune of \$3.4 million).

H 7217 would result in the loss of jobs in Rhode Island, as well as nationally, major losses of sales revenue to Rhode Island businesses and, as a result, the loss of substantial tax revenue for Rhode Island and other states.





**These common hunting guns will all be banned in RI based on H7217. A pistol grip or thumbhole stock is not a military feature and is preferred for safer control and is favored with those with disabilities. A telescoping stock allows for 2-3" of "length-of-pull" adjustment for taller / shorter users and is not a military feature.**




Mossberg 935 12 gauge semi-automatic turkey shotgun. **Currently Legal** would become illegal in a 1-feature test (pistol grip).

Comes in telescoping stock version, currently legal in RI.



Mossberg 930 12 gauge semi-automatic hunting / home defense shotgun. **Currently Legal** but would become illegal in a 1-feature test (pistol grip).




Remington SP-10 12 gauge semi-automatic turkey shotgun. **Would become illegal** in a 1-feature Test (thumbhole stock).

**Common "traditional" .308 caliber semi-auto hunting rifles will be banned with detachable magazines from the factory. No functional difference from the AR-15, but a much more powerful.**



Integral Pistol Grip

Remington 750 Semi-Automatic .308 caliber with detachable magazine in traditional wood stock.



Same Remington 750 Semi-Automatic, but in thumbhole hunting stock. **Would become illegal** in 1-feature test due to thumbhole stock.




Turnbull TAR-10 (AR-10) .308 semi-automatic hunting rifle in traditional wood stocks. Also comes in less powerful .223 TAR-15 (AR-15) version **Would become illegal** in 1-feature test due to pistol grip.

**Common .223 caliber Semi-automatic Rifles. All are the same caliber and function as the AR-15 “modern style sporting rifle”. All currently legal in RI but most would be illegal in 1-feature test.**

Shown with standard factory 10 round magazine,


Integral Pistol Grip



Same Rifle in “Target” version with thumbhole stock for stability (Olympic stock). Harmonic Dampener on front, not a “silencer”.  
**Would become illegal in 1-feature test due to thumbhole stock.**



Remington R-15 VTR hunting model. .223 / 5.56 caliber “AR-15”. Standard factory magazines with 10, 20, and 30 round capacity. **Would become illegal in 1-feature test due to pistol grip.**



Remington R-15 VTR Thumbhole hunting model.  
.223 / 5.56 caliber “AR-15”. Standard factory magazines with 10, 20, and 30 round capacity. **Would become illegal in 1-feature test due to thumbhole stock.**

**Two versions of “AK”. Note that all “traditional” rifle and shotgun stocks have an integral “pistol grip” behind the trigger, as shown in the top example. In the proposed 1-feature test, the bottom example would become banned because the grip protrudes.**
