



**Testimony Re: H-8093 Abused and Neglected Children  
House Judiciary  
March 12, 2026**

**Rhode Island KIDS COUNT strongly supports passage of Chair McEntee’s bill, H-8093**, which would expand the definition of educational programs that have a duty to report child abuse and neglect. This bill would add camps, afterschool programs, youth groups as well as charter and parochial schools to the statute.

Summer camps, afterschool programs, and extracurricular programs are widely used services in Rhode Island, particularly for children of working parents. In Rhode Island, 77% of children ages six to 17 have all parents in the workforce and many need a safe, high-quality learning environment during the hours, days, and weeks when their parents are at work and school is not in session.

**In 2024, Rhode Island enacted legislation to develop a summer camp licensing system but implementation has been delayed due to policy challenges related to reporting and investigating child abuse and neglect at camps.** The package of three bills related to summer camp licensing, DCYF investigations of child abuse and neglect at camps, and this bill requested by the Attorney General address these challenges so that summer camp licensing can occur be implemented in 2027.

Having a clear system for licensing summer day camps will help families find safe and high-quality options for their children. Licensing camps will help families who qualify for the Child Care Assistance Program to use the subsidy to help pay for the cost of camp.

Licensing camps will help the state communicate with and support summer camp programs by offering information about trainings, funding opportunities, and providing resources to help during emergencies.

It will be important to ensure DCYF has sufficient staffing and systems to investigate reports of child abuse and neglect and that DHS has sufficient staffing, data systems, and resources to successfully license and monitor the health and safety of camps, including responding to health and safety complaints from staff and parents.
