The American Cancer Society Cancer Action network (ACS CAN) is the non-partisan, non-profit advocacy affiliate of the American Cancer Society. We advocate for evidence-based public policies to reduce the cancer burden for everyone.

On behalf of ACS CAN, I would like to thank the Committee for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of House Bill 5376, which would allow for the creation of a special license plate to raise awareness for colon cancer, with part of the proceeds from the sale of each plate going to support the Partnership to Reduce Cancer in Rhode Island (PRCRI).

We would also like to thank Chairwoman Donovan for introducing this bill and elevating the issue of colon cancer, the fourth most diagnosed cancer in the Ocean State. In 2021, ACS CAN was proud to champion the Maryellen Goodwin Colorectal Cancer Awareness Act, which in-part eliminated cost-sharing for colorectal cancer screenings. While colorectal cancer incidence and mortality rates have generally declined, especially in those 50 and older, there remains a concerning increase in younger adults facing more advanced-stage diagnoses of colon cancer in Rhode Island.^{1,2}

As Rhode Island's state-wide cancer coalition, PRCRI has been making tremendous strides in cancer prevention and health equity throughout the Rhode Island. The Partnership works closely with the Comprehensive Cancer Control, Women's Cancer Screening, and Colorectal Cancer Prevention Programs at the Rhode Island Department of Health to bring evidence-based programs and resources to the community. Their areas of work include:

- **Prevention:** The Partnership strives to share information on programs that are available to practitioners and individuals to learn more about their ability to reduce the incidence of cancer and the associated risk factors by implementing primary prevention strategies. These programs offer specific learning and resources for anyone trying to address health and wellness initiatives.
