Re: Letter of Opposition - House Bill 7110 The Personal Hygiene Product Safety and Toxic Metal Removal Act of 2026

Dear Chairwoman Donovan:

On behalf of the members of the Personal Care Products Council (PCPC)¹, I am writing to express our opposition to HB 7110. This bill puts Rhode Island scientifically out of step with the federal government and countries around the world in its attempt to restrict certain substances.


Cosmetics and personal care products companies work with leading scientific and medical experts and invest significant resources to ensure the safety of their products. In addition to this strong commitment to safety, federal law requires that every cosmetics product be substantiated for safety before it goes to market. The U.S. Food & Drug Administration (FDA) statistics confirm that cosmetics are one of the safest product categories used by Americans today.

HB 7110 abandons state, federal, and international regulatory precedent by setting unachievable standards for heavy metals. Lead, arsenic and cadmium are never intentionally added and only present at trace levels if ingredients are mined from the earth or contain water in the formulation, as these are naturally occurring heavy metals that are ubiquitous in the environment, including soil, air, and water.

Passing HB 7110 would establish an unrealistic and unreasonable requirement for personal care product development and production and create a tougher standard for cosmetics than the food and water we consume.
