RE: Written Testimony on 2026 – **H-7740** AN ACT RELATING TO BUSINESSES AND PROFESSIONS -- NURSES (Details each of those limited emergency circumstances where a registered nurse and advanced practice registered nurses, may safely administer anesthesia such as critical life-saving or emergency situations where there is imminent threat to life or limb.)

Position: **OPPOSED**

Thank you Chairwoman Donovan and members of the committee for the opportunity to provide testimony on H-7740

As the professional association representing over 800 Rhode Island licensed physician assistants (PAs), the Rhode Island Academy of PAs (RIAPA) is concerned with bill H-7740.

The following list highlights our areas of concern:

- Our biggest concern is that this legislation is too broad in nature, doesn't account for all patient environments, nuances or situations
- Directly impacts procedural areas as well as directly impacting Critical Care Areas, ERs, Medical and Surgical ICUs.
- May limit access for patients and could potentially lead to having send patients out of state for sedation assisted procedures such as colonoscopies, endoscopies, and pediatric imaging.
- These bills will increase length of stay for inpatient units by increasing delays in obtaining procedures that require sedation
- May increase healthcare costs by now requiring anesthesiologists or CRNAs to provide sedation and care to a patient population that has been traditionally and safely managed by MDs, DOs, PAs, and NPs.
- Restricts RNs from administering or titrating sedating medications on non-intubated patients in critical care areas, where that is exactly what these RNs are trained and credentialed to do.
- We are concerned when the practice of medicine such as the choice of medications used and how medications are delivered becomes part of the legislative process rather than a regulatory process.

- Medicine is constantly evolving and to legislate restrictions in this particular area would likely result in an annual review and possibly need for ongoing updates and revisions which would be easier through a regulatory process.
- This bill seems to try and address issues that are better served and solved by the regulatory process and not through legislation. It is our understanding that the Department of Health is working on a regulatory update to address any patient safety concerns.

In summary, the RIAPA believes that H-7740 in it's present form does not serve patients or providers and create restrictions that limit access and create an additional burden on the healthcare system and healthcare workforce. We would be happy to work with the bill sponsors with our concerns.
