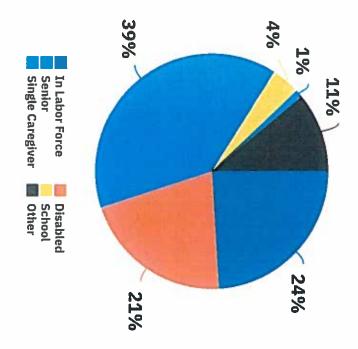

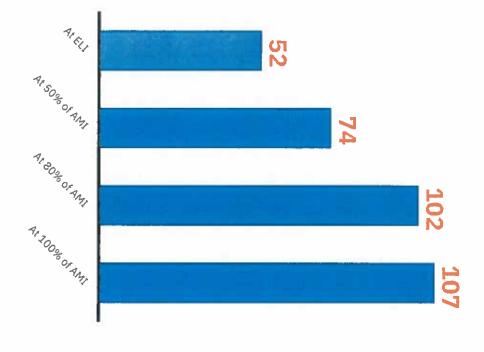
RENTER HOUSEHOLDS

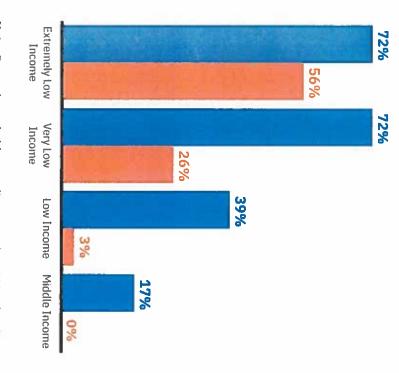
AFFORDABLE AND AVAILABLE HOMES PER 100 RENTER HOUSEHOLDS
