- We depend on municipalities to update us on units that RIHousing does not have financing in
- Every year there are some corrections to LMIH unit counts wrong unit count for. We have tried to limit those corrections be some unit count corrections incorporated that we missed in this chart to better reflect actual production, but there may when we learn that some developments that we had the
- This information does NOT include changes in group home

LMIH Production: 2011-2020

- Over the past 10 years, a total of 2,015 new developed in RI low- moderate-income housing units were
- 87.2% were rental housing
- 12.7% were homes for sale
- The average number of new LMI units developed since 2016 is about 171 units.





LMIH Production by Municipality



- **Providence and North Kingstown** respectively. units, constructing 603 and 212 new units, developed the greatest number of LMI
- 5 municipalities (Cranston, Foster, North developed 0 new LMI units Providence, Warren, and West Greenwich)
- 8 municipalities (Bristol, East Providence, per year produced fewer than one unit on average Shoreham, Portsmouth, and Scituate) Exeter, Glocester, Little Compton, New



Income Caps on LMIH Units

- greater than 80% AMI and 23% of units developed had an income cap 49% of units developed had an income cap less than or equal to 50% of the area median income (AMI)
- developed with income caps above 80% AMI are: The 5 municipalities with the greatest share of units
- Glocester
- Portsmouth
- Smithfield
- Lincoln
- Narragansett



LMIH Production of Homes for Sale

- developed LMI units created for homeownership Municipalities with more than half of their total
- Municipalities with fewer than 2 LMI units developed on average per year
- Largely either predominantly higher-income areas densities (Glocester, Scituate) or more rural towns with lower population (Little Compton, Exeter, Portsmouth, Jamestown),
