<b>Alaska</b>	\$6 million to the Department of Commerce , Community, and Economic Development and the Department of Fish and Game for food security grants.
<b>California</b>	\$35.1 million to the Secretary of California Health and Human Services. \$450 million for local assistance, to the State Department of Social Services for the Community Care Expansion Program.
<b>Colorado</b>	\$3 million to the high-risk families cash fund in the Department of Human Services.  \$4.75 million to the department of heath and human services for the Colorado domestic abuse program fund (funding is appropriated from the economic recovery and relief cash fund created and from the federal coronavirus state fiscal recovery fund). \$5 million to the Dept. of Human Services for the Food Pantry Assistance Grant Program.
<b>Connecticut</b>	\$1 million to the Department of Agriculture for food insecurity grants to food pantries and food banks. \$1.2 million for Child First. \$10 million to the Department of Social Services for the Fair Haven Clinic. \$100,000 to the Department of Children and Families for the Case Boricua-Meriden. \$100,000 to the Department of Economic and Community Development for Beta Iota Boule Foundation Youth Services. \$2.5 million to the Department of Social Services for MyCT Resident One Stop. \$20,000 to the Department of Children and Families for the fostering community. \$200,000 to the Department of Agriculture for farmers market nutrition. \$200,000 to the Department of Agriculture for senior food vouchers. \$200,000 to the Department of Education for Hartford Youth Services. \$200,000 to the Department of Housing for the downtown evening soup kitchen. \$3.5 million to the Office of Early Childhood for Parents Fees for 3-4 Year Old's at State Funded Childcare Centers. \$5 million to the Department of Social Services for Community Action Agencies. \$5.3 million to the Office of Early Childhood for Care4Kids Parent Fees. \$500,000 to the Department of Agriculture for the farm-to-school grant. \$500,000 to the Department of Social Services for New Reach Life Haven Shelter. \$750,000 to the Department of Social Services for Mary Wade nursing home and assisted living facility. \$8 million for universal home visiting.
<b>Hawaii</b>	\$1.3 million in fiscal year 2022 in order to support an adolescent treatment and healing center on Kauai. \$832,500 in fiscal year 2022 and fiscal year 2023 to retain in-community youth programs to allow for continued services.

\$1 million to the Department of Children and Family Services for a grant to the Court Appointed Special Advocates of Cook County to be used to advocate for the timely placement of children in permanent, safe, and stable homes, for purposes permitted by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

\$1 million to the Department of Human Services for a grant to Tri-County Urban League to provide support programming for individuals in the Peoria area, for purposes permitted by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

\$1 million to the Department of Human Services for grants and administrative expenses associated with Special Olympics Illinois, for purposes permitted by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

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### Illinois

\$14 million to the Department of Human Services for income assistance and related distributive purposes, including such Federal funds as are made available by the Federal Government for grants and administrative expenses associated with Immigrant Integration Services and for other Immigrant Services pursuant to 305 ILCS 5/12-4.34, for purposes permitted by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

\$150,000 to the Department of Human Services for a grant to Well Kids Learning Hub for the purpose of providing support to children aged 0 to 18 years, for purposes permitted by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.  
\$2 million to the Department of Human Services for a grant to the United African Organization Welcoming Centers, for purposes permitted by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

\$250,000 to the Department of Human Services for a grant to Peoria Friendship House to be used for family programming and community services, for purposes permitted by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

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**Illinois**

\$5 million to the Department of Human Services for a grant to the welcoming centers, for purposes permitted by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

\$60 million to the Department of Human Services for grants to community providers and local governments for youth employment programs for purposes allowed by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

\$700,000 to the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for a grant to the Urbana-Champaign Independent Media Center to provide small community based grants for community service and violence prevention in Urbana, for purposes permitted by the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

\$80 million to the Department of Human Services for a deposit into the DHS State Projects Fund for purposes allowed the Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Fund under the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

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**Maine**

\$10 million (\$5 million in FY 2022 and \$5 million in FY 2023) to establish one limited-period Social Services Manager I position through June 17, 2023 and provides one-time funding for grants to renovate, expand or construct child care facilities to increase availability of accessible and affordable child care.

\$2.5 million (\$1.2 million in FY 2022 and \$1.3 million in FY 2023) to establish 16 limited-period CareerCenter Consultant positions for the Department of Labor through June 10, 2023.

\$4 million to allocate additional funds for counsel fees due to a backlog of cases caused by the COVID-19 pandemic

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**Maryland**

\$46 million to extend enhanced temporary cash assistance & temporary disability benefits.

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**Minnesota**

\$10 million to create a homeless shelter emergency response team at the Department of Human Services. The funding will be used to cover targeted, immediate response activities to mitigate or prevent outbreaks in congregate settings serving people experie

\$4 million for Education Partnerships Coalition members and other education partners to maintain, expand, or develop their coordination of community services. The collective allocation will provide \$500,000 each to the five EPC members in Greater Minnesota as well as Generation Next, \$250,000 each to Minneapolis Northside Achievement Zone and St. Paul Promise Neighborhood, and \$500,000 in competitive grant opportunities (up to \$100,000 each) for other partnership program locations not named for the purpose of initial planning and development.

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**Nevada**

\$5 million to the State Treasurer to be administered as grants to persons with disabilities who are under 18 years of age through the Nevada ABLE Savings Program established pursuant to NRS 427A.889 to assist persons with disabilities who have been negatively or disparately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic with expenses related to education, housing, transportation, employment training and support, assistive technology, personal support services, health care costs, financial management and other qualified disability expenses.

\$6 million to the Collaboration Center Foundation to augment services and programs implemented to address the negative or disparate impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on persons with disabilities.

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<b>Nevada</b>	\$7.6 million to address increased levels of food insecurity resulting from the negative economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on low-income families.
<b>New Hampshire</b>	\$2.2 million to the Department of Health and Human Services to fund additional support to the Bureau of Family Assistance Call Center when the Federal Public Health Emergency comes to an end.
<b>New Jersey</b>	\$10 million for food and hunger.
<b>Oregon</b>	\$100 million to the Oregon Youth Authority for facility programs. \$14 million to the Department of Human Services for emergency food supply stabilization.
<b>Pennsylvania</b>	\$282 million to the Department of Human Services for long-term living programs.
<b>Utah</b>	\$165 million for social services including vaccine distribution, pandemic-related mental health services, establishing a food bank in San Juan County and the Navajo Nation.
<b>Vermont</b>	\$1.3 million to distribute monies to families participating in the Reach Up Program.  \$1.3 million to the Vermont Food Bank to pay the costs of the Vermont Farmers Families Food Box Program For Jan. and Feb. 2021. \$3 million to the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets for the Working Lands Program for grants related to slaughter, meat processing and meat processing training proposals. \$300,000 for grants to peer-led and impacted member organizations for emergency outreach services. \$700,000 to the Association of Africans Living in Vermont and the U.S. Committee for Refugees and Immigrants' Vermont Refugee Resettlement Program for various purposes. \$82,000 to the Vermont Food Bank for statewide provision of diapers to families in need.
<b>Virginia</b>	\$14.6 million to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services for food assistance, including the expansion of food access and healthcare partnerships, development of a shelf-stable food purchase program, and the purchase of food from local farmers through the Virginia Farm to Virginia Families Food Box Program.
<b>Washington</b>	\$20 million to the Department of Agriculture to implement the food assistance program \$340 million for the Washington Immigrant Relief Fund, a disaster assistance program, to provide grants to eligible persons.  \$45 million to develop a state alternative to the U.S. Department of Agriculture Farmers to Families Food Box Program and provide hunger relief organizations, including organizations that service BIPOC and other socially disadvantaged communities.

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**Washington**

\$5.39 million to provide increase benefits for the food assistance program to maintain parity with benefits under the supplemental nutrition assistance program for July 1 - Sept. 30.

\$5.39 million to temporarily increase food benefits to recipients of the state's food assistance program in order to main parity with benefits offered under the supplemental nutrition assistance program for the months or April through July 2021.

\$5.5 million for the Department of Children, Youth, and Families for the children and families services program.

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
