Dear Speaker Shekarchi:

I am pleased to provide you with the findings and recommendations of the Rhode Island Online Data Transparency and Privacy Protection Commission (the "Commission").

The Commission consisted of eleven (11) members and included several dedicated professionals from the information and technology field, the Internet service provider field, and related fields.

The Commission was convened to make a comprehensive study and provide recommendations to the House of Representatives with respect to legislation and/or regulations that will protect individuals from disclosures of personally identifiable information through the Internet by operators of commercial websites or online services. Accordingly, the Commission studied and discussed potential legislation and related topics such as: whether or not the potential legislation would conflict with any existing state or federal law; whether or not the Model Student Act should be utilized as the legislative means by which students are protected; enforcement and jurisdictional issues pertaining to the potential legislation; the use of recommendation engines; and definitions contained in such potential legislation.

This final report is a culmination of thirteen (13) hearings that began in December, 2018 and ended in June, 2022. It contains information presented by various witnesses who testified before the Commission, as well as presentations made, which the Commission has studied.

I would like to express my gratitude to all members of the Commission for their willingness to take part in this process, and we appreciate the investment of the time and talent that they graciously provided.

Commission Findings

The Commission studied the following three** draft bills along with related issues pertaining to online data privacy concerns:

- An Act Relating to Commercial Law General Regulatory Provisions Rhode Island Right-To-Know Data Transparency and Privacy Protection Act, which is a draft bill that regulates online service providers and commercial websites (the "Right-to-Know Draft Bill").
- An Act Relating to Public Utilities and Carriers Duties of Public Utilities and Carriers, which is a draft bill related to student privacy (the "Student Privacy Draft Bill").
- An Act Relating to Commercial Law General Regulatory Provisions Establishing the "Consumer Personal Data Protection Act of 2019", which is a draft bill that regulates data brokers (the "Data Broker Draft Bill").

Based on its study of these draft bills as well as related legislation and issues pertaining to online data privacy concerns, testimony presented to it, and discussions by and amongst its members, **the Commission makes the following findings**:

- 1. There is no federal law in place that sufficiently protects Rhode Island citizens with respect to online data privacy concerns and issues.
- 2. In order to protect Rhode Island citizens with respect to online data privacy concerns and issues, we would encourage passage of <u>Bill # 2022 -- H 7400</u>, <u>An Act Relating to Commercial Law General Regulatory Provisions Rhode Island Transparency and Privacy Protection Act</u>, which:
 - Is based on the Right-to-Know Draft Bill.
 - Was introduced during the 2022 legislative session.
 - Is enforceable in Rhode Island as any violation of this bill would constitute a violation of the general regulatory provisions of commercial law in title 6 and shall constitute a deceptive trade practice in violation of chapter 13.1 of title 6.
- 3. In order to protect Rhode Island citizens with respect to online data privacy concerns and issues, there is a need to further study the Student Cloud Computing Privacy and Protection Act (Bill # 2020 -- H 7724), which is based on the Student Privacy Draft Bill, with a focus on determining if Rhode Island should adopt and enact the Model Student Online Personal Information Protection Act, and there is a need to further study the Consumer Personal Data Protection Act of 2020 (Bill # 2020 -- H 7723), which is based on the Data Broker Draft Bill.

**Note: The Commission also reviewed three other draft bills (i.e., An Act Relating to State

Affairs and Government – Office of Information Technology, An Act Relating to Commercial

Law – General Regulatory Provisions – The Data Security Breach Notification Act, and An Act

Relating to Criminal Procedure – The Rhode Island Biometric Information Protection Privacy Act), but did not conduct an in-depth study of such bills. Accordingly, the Commission, at this time, will not provide findings or recommendations regarding such bills.

Commission Recommendations

Based on its study of the above-referenced draft bills, testimony presented to it, and discussions by and amongst its members, the Commission makes the following recommendations:

- Encourage passage of Bill # 2022 -- H 7400, The Rhode Island Transparency and Privacy Protection Act, which is based on the "Right-to-Know Draft Bill", and which is attached hereto, incorporated by reference herein, and may be found in Appendix B of this final report.
- Conduct further study regarding Bill # 2020 -- H 7724, The Student Cloud Computing Privacy and Protection Act, which is based on the Student Privacy Draft Bill, with a focus on determining if the Model Student Online Personal Information Protection Act should be adopted and what impact, if any, such a bill would have on existing law.
- Conduct further study regarding Bill # 2020 -- H 7723, The Consumer Personal Data Protection Act of 2020, which is based on the Data Broker Draft Bill.

EXPLANATION

BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

OF

AN ACT

RELATING TO COMMERCIAL LAW - GENERAL REGULATORY PROVISIONS -RHODE ISLAND DATA TRANSPARENCY AND PRIVACY PROTECTION ACT

1 This act would require online service providers and commercial websites that collect, store and sell personally identifiable information to disclose what categories of personally identifiable 2 information they collect and to what third parties they sell the information. This act does not 3 prohibit the collection or sale of personally identifiable information and does not require the retention or disclosure of personally identifiable information by online service providers or 5 commercial websites. Any intentional disclosure of personal information in violation of the 6 provisions of this act would be punishable by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100) nor 7 more than five hundred dollars (\$500) per disclosure with sole enforcement vested in the 8 9 department of the attorney general. 10

This act would take effect on January 1, 2023.
