Rainy Day Fund

- Appropriations limited to 97% of the estimated general revenues
 - From all sources including prior year surplus
- Remaining 3% goes into a budget reserve and cash stabilization account or "Rainy Day Fund"
 - Can only be used under specific conditions
 - Current Year Revenue drop in May
 - Amounts used must be replaced next year
 - Use has implications for RICAP funds

Rhode Island Capital Plan Funds

 Appropriations limited to 97% of revenues

> Remaining 3% goes to Budget Reserve/RDF

Excess above 5% limit goes to RICAP fund

 RDF total is capped at 5% of revenues RICAP used for capital projects

> Unused funds carry forward to next year

Art. 2, Sec. 1 & 3 - Supplemental Budget Reserve Account

- 2023 Assembly created Supplemental Reserve Account
 - Transferred \$55.0 million
 - Essentially increased total reserves to 6%
 - Required State Controller to transfer half of any unexpected excess revenues at fiscal close to account
 - Draft FY 2023 data shows \$6.5 million
- Article repeals excess transfer and recapture funds in FY 2024

Art. 2, Sec. 2 – Indirect Cost Recovery

- All revenues = general revenue, unless otherwise noted – RIGL 35-3-14 (a)
- 10% indirect charge on receipts unless:
 - Prohibited (federal or other)
 - Charitable
 - Specifically listed as exempt
- Represents overhead charges
 - Similar to those allowed on federal grants
- Section 2 exempts 3 newly created accounts from indirect charges

Information Technology Fund

- Created by 2011 Assembly for acquiring information technology improvements
 - Designed to create pool of resources for projects instead of borrowing
 - Acquiring information technology improvements
 - Originally supported by land sale revenue
 - Other one-time and ongoing sources added
 - Some project specific surcharges

Information Technology Fund

- Governor proposes changes to sources deposited into account
 - Article 2, Sections 4, 5 and 7
 - Group homes sale proceeds
 - Article 6, Section 7
 - Vital records surcharges

Art. 2, Sec. 4, 5 & 7 – Group Homes

- Creates Group Home Facility
 Improvement Fund with proceeds from:
 - Sale of state-owned group homes or rents collected from provider agencies
 - Homes licensed by Dept. of BHDDH
 - Upkeep & maintenance of state-owned facilities
 - Use of funds will be at the Department's discretion
 - Exempt from 10% percent indirect cost recovery
 - These "land sales" would not longer be deposited into IT restricted receipt account

Art. 2, Sec. 4, 5 & 7 – Group Homes

- State-owned homes
 - Division of Developmental Disabilities
 - 107 operated by providers in private system
 - 20 in state-run RICLAS system
 - Division of Behavioral Health Care
 - 27 operated by Mental Health Services Providers
 - 8 operated by Substance Use Services Providers

RIDOH: Office of Vital Records

- Responsible for statewide vital records system involving
 - Births
 - Marriages
 - Deaths and fetal deaths
 - Provides services to the public
 - Certified copies of vital records, corrections/authorization to a vital record
 - Hospital voluntary affidavit of paternities

Article 6, Sec. 7 – Vital Records

- 2018 Assembly authorized chief of Office of Vital Records to assess surcharges for certified records
 - Pay for new Vital Records System modules
 - Deposited into IT restricted receipt account
 - \$0.4 million annually
 - Project entering maintenance phase
 - Article 6 Sec. 7 shifts those receipts to general revenues
 - Budgets \$400k in DOH operating budget

Art. 2, Sec. 8 – Commodity Supplemental Food Prog. Claims

- Creates a restricted receipt account in the Office of Healthy Aging
 - To address a potential federal audit finding for funds received through loss claims
- OHA receives federal Commodity
 Supplemental Food Program funds
 - Awarded to RI Community Food Bank
 - For food loss, funds from a claim paid to OHA
 - Need to be deposited into a restricted receipt account & used for specific purposes

Art. 2, Sec. 6 – Executive Climate Change Coordinating Council

- 2023 Assembly provided Council with \$4.5 million from Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative funds
 - Sale of carbon emission credits
 - \$3.0 million one-time transfer from proceeds
 - Up to \$1.5 million annually
 - Requires annual report
 - How funds are used to meet objectives of 2021
 Act on Climate

Art. 2, Sec. 6 – Executive Climate Change Coordinating Council

 Authorizes State Budget Officer to create restricted receipt accounts for state agencies that receive funding from Council

Article 2 – Director of Department of Health

- Authorizes Governor to determine salary for Department of Health director position for 2024 only
- Would exempt that position from current law limitations
 - Annual public hearing process
 - Assembly option for disapproval

Salaries of Directors

- RIGL 36-4-16.4
 - In March of each year, DOA to hold public hearing to determine salaries for department directors
 - Referred to General Assembly by last day of April to go into effect 30 days after, unless amended
 - Some exemptions have been enacted
 - Notably for filling the DCYF position

Article 2 – Director of Department of Health

- Current law requires appointment of a 5-year term
 - Eligible for reappointment
 - Not engaged in other occupation
- Department has been without appointed director since January 2022

Healthcare Professionals

- Center for Professional Boards and Licensing in Department of Health
 - Licenses, certifies and disciplines healthcare professionals
 - Investigates complaints
 - Identifies professional standards to ensure highest quality health care and protection of the public

Art. 3, Sec. 15 – Healthcare Workforce Data

- Section 15 authorizes RIDOH to collect workforce and other data from licensed healthcare professionals
 - Upon licensing/renewal process
 - Data provided on voluntary basis
 - Data would be used for healthcare planning and workforce analysis
 - Prohibits making individual information public
