Target Budget

Target

- Budget Office provided a general revenue target of \$1,269,471
 - Current Service Adjustments of \$5,182
 - 7% reduction of \$71,341
- Request met target by reducing discretionary grants by \$125,975 and adjusting other operating expenses

Staffing

- Governor includes \$0.6 million for 6.0 positions for FY 2014 and FY 2015
 - Consistent with enacted and requested
- Currently 6.0 positions filled
- Assumes approximately \$40,000 from turnover savings in FY 2014
- FY 2015: Fully funds 6.0 positions

Discretionary Grants

- Governor recommends \$1.0 million more than enacted from general revenues
 - Council's constrained request reduced general revenues by \$0.1 million

Discretionary Grants

- The Council requests \$0.1 million more than enacted from general revenues
- \$0.1 million for the Main Street Initiative urban arts and beautification program
 - The Governor did not recommend the increased funding for this program however included additional funding for Creative and Cultural Economy Grants

Creative and Cultural Economy

- Article 5 recommends \$35.0 million from new general obligation bonds for November 2014 ballot
 - \$30.0 million renovations to public and nonprofit theaters and performance spaces
 - \$5.0 million historic sites and nonprofits
- Governor has not provided specific information as to process, grantees, or awards
- Hearing was held on February 26

Creative and Cultural Economy

- Annual debt service for the bond would be approximately \$2.8 million per year for 20 years
 - Assumes 5.0 percent rate

Creative and Cultural Economy

- \$1.0 million for grants promoting the arts-based economy throughout the state
 - Includes welcome signs and enhancement transportation corridors, gateways and districts
 - Joint program between DOT, HPHC, RI Commerce Corporation, local municipalities and regional convention

Creative and Cultural Economy

- Governor's budget recommendation includes investments in arts-based economy
 - Recognizes the role of the state's arts in attracting tourism and creating economic activity
 - New Creative and Cultural Economy Coordinator in RI Commerce Corporation
- 2013 Assembly Created "State of the Arts Task Force" for collaboration of state agencies in attracting and retaining arts based economic activity
 - As of February 2014, the task force has not met

Community Service Grants

- Grants for community based projects at artsbased organizations
- Current recipients include: AS220, PPAC, Trinity Repertory Company, RI Philharmonic

Percent for Arts Program

- Percent for Art Program
 - Includes \$0.6 million in FY 2014 and \$0.6 million in FY 2015 from other funds
 - As of January 1, 1988, all state buildings or facilities constructed, remodeled, or renovated shall include works of art for public display
 - At least 1.0% of the total cost of project
