# Target Budget

- Budget Office provided general revenue target of \$8.1 million
  - Current service adjustments of \$1.6 million
  - ▶ 8.0% reduction of \$0.6 million
- Office did not submit constrained request
- Gov. recommends \$0.8 million over target
  - Revised cost of the eGov initiative
  - ► New initiatives

# **Regulatory Reform Initiative**

- Creates an online, indexed and searchable Code of State Regulations
  - In concert with the Office of Regulatory Reform
- The FY 2017 enacted includes \$706,652
  - ► Two contractors, hardware, licensing and 2.0 FTE
  - ► The Office shifted \$293,980 to FY 2018
  - ► The initiative will go live in FY 2018

The Governor shifts \$0.1 million in FY 2017 and \$0.2 million in FY 2018 to the Office of Regulatory Reform

#### eGov Initiative

- The Office is relying on technology upgrades to meet its strategic goals
  - Redesign the Lobby Tracker application
  - Redesign the Open Meeting User Interface
  - Redesign the Board and Commissions Database
  - Reimagine the RI Governor's Owner Manual
  - Restructure a new Business Services Database

### eGov Initiative

- Gov. FY 2018 \$457,545 from general revenues
  - ▶ \$263,026 more than enacted
    - \$262,026 two Junior Developers for full year
- Gov. FY 2017 Rev \$273,671 from general revenues
  - ▶ \$79,152 more than enacted
    - ► \$65,520 two Junior Developers for one quarter
    - ▶ \$10,450 for staff training

#### Personnel

#### ► Gov. FY 2018 - \$6.7 million from all funds

▶ \$5.9 million from general revenues

- ▶ \$0.3 million more general revenues
  - Full staffing, benefit adjustments per Budget Office planning values
  - Statewide savings

# Gov. FY 2017 Revised - \$405 more general revenues

### Statewide Savings

Assessment to salaries that funds workers' comp., unemployment & unused leave Lowered from enacted based on experience ► Savings of \$1.2 million in FY 2017 ► Savings of \$1.5 million in FY 2018 Medical benefit cost growth Lower than initial estimates ► Savings of \$2.6 million in FY 2018 Total impact to the Department ▶ \$8,655 in FY 2017; \$30,295 in FY 2018

### **Role in Elections**

Secretary of State's Elections & Civics Division and Board of Elections are charged with different responsibilities

Complementary tasks, many of which are mandated by Rhode Island General Laws

# **Role in Elections**

#### Secretary of State

- Provides municipalities with forms for candidates
- Certifies federal and state candidates for ballot placement
- Prepares state and local referenda
- Describes and explains state referenda in Voter Handbook

#### **Board of Elections**

- Supervises all elections
- Instructs and certifies all election officials assigned to polls
- Trains poll workers
- Prepares and distributes poll worker guides and related materials

# Gov. FY 2018 - \$45,778 from general revenues

- ► Gov. recommends \$222 less than enacted
  - Includes \$21,778 for annual dues for the Electronic Registration Information Center
  - ▶ \$20,000 for mailing to people who have moved
  - ► \$4,000 for printing expenses

Gov. FY 2017 - \$222 less general revenues

Reduction of annual dues

### **Online Voter Registration**

- FY 2017 Enacted \$130,000 from general revenues
- Governor recommends \$90,000 for FY 2017 based on updated project costs
  - Allow initial registration and/or change to registration information online
- ► It went live on Monday August 1, 2016
- One time expense for FY 2017 only

# New Voting Equipment

- 2015 Assembly enacted 2015-H 6312, Substitute A authorizing the Secretary of State to:
  - Submit and approve specifications used in procuring voting systems, voting system-related services and accessible voting equipment
- State last purchased voting equipment in 1997

# New Voting Equipment

- Gov. recommends \$1.4 million for FY 2017 and \$1.2 million for FY 2018 from general revenues
  - ► Multi-year purchase from FY 2017 to FY 2024
  - Optical scan ballot tabulation system, accessible voting equipment, 50 ballot-on demand printers
  - 590 voting machines
  - Total Project costs of \$9.3 million

### All Other Election Expenses

- FY 2018 \$0.7 million from general revenues
  - Includes \$0.4 million for salaries/benefits
  - \$1.1 million less than enacted
    - ► Off-year in the two-year election cycle

#### FY 2017 Rev - \$0.1 million less general revenues

Renewed lease of the West River building

- Comprehensive archives and records management services for all public records of the State
- Local government records program
  - Provides advisory and technical services to municipal governments for public records
- Historical Records Trust Fund receipts
  - Fees collected by cities and towns for various land transactions and for probate filings

#### Gov. FY 2018 - \$0.5 million from all funds

- Includes \$87,150 from general revenues
- Gov. recommends \$0.1 million less than enacted from all funds
  - Reduction of rental costs at Westminster St.
  - Turnover savings

#### State House Tour Programs

- Gov. FY 2018 \$25,000 from general revenues
  - Gov. recommends \$10,000 more than enacted
    - More tours
    - Better guide to group ratio
    - Better learning experience for school groups
    - Better content and guide training
- Gov. FY 2017 Rev \$10,000 more general revenues

# Library Upgrades

Gov. recommends \$15,000 from general revenues for FY 2017

- Funding was not included in FY 2017 request
  - Purchase audio visual equipment
  - Provide info about state house hearings and events

# Scanning Project

- Gov. recommends \$50,000 from general revenues for FY 2018
  - 38,000 files, containing between 2 and 1,000 pages are needed to be imaged and matched
    - Files could be viewable online
    - Allows for transparency of businesses

FY 2017 enacted - \$100,000 from RICAP for study

- Office is advocating for a new permanent building
- ▶ Request includes \$150,000 from RICAP funds for FY 2017
- Request includes \$5.0 million from RICAP funds for architectural and engineering services for FY 2018
- Total project costs of \$67.5 million from RICAP funds and G.O. Bond funds

Gov. only recommends \$150,000 from RICAP for FY 2017 for revised cost of the study

### **Electronic Poll Books**

- FY 2017 Enacted \$195,000 from general revenues to purchase 200 e-poll books
  - Original plan was to acquire 1,600 and deploy statewide from FY 2017 through FY 2019
- The Office requests \$1.2 million for both FY 2017 and FY 2018 from IT funds for remaining 1,400 e-poll books
- Governor recommends \$25,000 from general revenues for maintenance costs for FY 2018

#### Grants

#### Rhode Island Historical Society

Governor recommends \$125,000 from general revenues pursuant to R.I.G.L. 29-2-1

- Newport Historical Society
  - Governor recommends \$18,000 from general revenues pursuant to R.I.G.L. 29-2-2
