Explanation by State Budget Office:

This bill would repeal the initial licensure fee of \$2500 for a hemp grower or handler license and reduce the license application fee from \$250 to \$100.

Comments on Sources of Funds: Revenue from hemp licenses and renewals are considered general revenues.

Summary of Facts and Assumptions:

The effective date is assumed to be late in FY 2020 and thus no impact is assumed in FY 2020.

As written, H7535 would eliminate the initial \$2,500 hemp grower/handler license fee, but not the biennial \$2,500 license renewal fee.

The Department of Business Regulation (DBR) notes the following technical issue. While the language of act does not make any direct changes to the language of 2-26-5(g) (setting forth the CBD distributor and CBD retailer license fees: initial \$500 and \$500 annual renewal), this bill could have an unintended effect. Under 2-26-5(f), a hemp grower/handler can get a CBD distributor and CBD retailer license at no additional cost (no initial fee and no renewal). As such, a CBD distributor/CBD retailer applicant may find a loophole to avoid paying any CBD initial license fee by applying first for the grower/handler license (with no initial license fee per this bill) then applying for the CBD retailer/distributor (with no initial fee per subsection (f)), rather than applying directly for the CDB retailer/distributer license only. The Department does not expect all CBD license applicants to do this, since the CBD retailer/distributor fee is relatively small.

The Department estimates 6 retailers/distributors may use this loophole, which would equate to \$3,000 of lost revenue (split over 2021 and 2022 that at \$1,500 per year).

DBR does not foresee any new expenditures as a result of this legislation. For revenue, as the bill is written, DBR estimates a loss of 7,500 + 450 (total 7,950) for each of 2021 and 2022 (a loss of initial new license fees and reduced application fees for 3 hemp grower/handler licenses in each of those years). Also, due to the technical issue cited above, an additional loss of revenue of 1,500 in each of 2021 and 2022 is also estimated. There are currently 14 hemp grower/handler licenses issued by DBR.
