The amendments include changes to appropriation amounts in Article 1, Relating to Making Appropriations in Support of FY 2016, and Article 10, Relating to Making Revised Appropriations in Support of FY 2015. This amendment is in addition to amendments submitted May 13, 2015.

## **ARTICLE 1, RELATING TO MAKING APPROPRIATIONS IN SUPPORT OF FY 2016**

### **SECTION 1, APPROPRIATIONS IN SUPPORT OF FY 2016**

#### **Department of Administration**

Decrease Capital Projects and Property Management – General Revenues, Page 4, Line 16 by \$592,049 from \$3,559,865 to \$2,967,816. These funds shift the facilities centralization of funding for personnel from the Department of Administration back to the Department of Environmental Management. A corresponding amendment appears in Environmental Management.

Increase Library and Information Services – General Revenues, Page 4, Line 30 by \$516,000 from \$913,995 to \$1,42,995. This amendment funds the Interlibrary Delivery System price increase based on pricing received in its recent bid opening. The current price is \$6.90 and the bid price was \$24.53 per stop. Rhode Island general law (RIGL Chapter 29-6-9) requires that the Office of Library and Informational Services (OLIS) fund the system in its entirety.

#### **General Treasurer**

Add new line, Page 13, insert after Line 8, Other Funds, ‘Tuition Savings Program – Administration’ and add \$424,560. This new line is for the administration associated with the tuition savings program, also known as the CollegeBoundfund® to be transferred from the Rhode Island Higher Education Assistance Authority to Treasury in FY 2016. The Treasury’s role will be similar to the role played by RIHEAA, coupled with its current State Investment Commission responsibilities. Two new FTE positions are also added.

#### **Executive Office of Health and Human Services**

Increase Hospitals General Revenues – Medical Assistance Program, Page 14, Line 27 by \$421,686 from \$106,120,581 to \$106,542,267 (inclusive of prior amendment). This increase represents a technical correction to the FY 2016 appropriation for the FFY 2015 Disproportionate Share Hospital payment.

Increase Hospitals Federal Funds – Medical Assistance Program, Page 15, Line 2 by \$427,118 from \$106,609,803 to \$107,036,921 (inclusive of prior amendment). This increase represents a technical correction to the FY 2016 appropriation for the FFY 2015 Disproportionate Share Hospital payment.

### **Department of Health**

Increase Restricted Receipt Funds – Central Management, Page 16, Line 15 by \$53,350. This amendment adds \$53,350 to the Miscellaneous Donations/Grants from Non-Profits account. The Department has received funding from the Alzheimer's Association, the United Way, and the National Association of Chronic Diseases. In addition, the Department anticipates additional donations from the National Multiple Sclerosis Society and possibly others to support expenditures in FY 2016.

Increase Federal Funds – Environmental and Health Services Regulation, Page 16, Line 23, by \$2,347,275 from \$5,801,677 to \$8,148,952. This increase shifts funds previously budgeted under the restricted receipt account State Revolving Fund Administration to a federal funds account in accordance with federal reporting requirements.

Decrease Restricted Receipts – Environmental and Health Services Regulation, Page 16, Line 24 by \$2,347,275 from \$3,167,989 to \$820,714. This decrease shifts funds budgeted within the restricted receipt account State Revolving Fund Administration to a federal funds account in accordance with federal reporting requirements.

### **Department of Human Services**

Increase General Revenues – Individual and Family Support, Page 17 Line 25 by \$23,914, from \$22,946,992 to \$22,970,906. This increase brings recommended financing for the additional \$206 monthly assisted living payment for individuals residing in non-Medicaid funded assisted living facilities and assisted living facilities financed by the Rhode Island Housing and Mortgage Finance Corporation to \$359,198 in FY 2016, consistent with testimony provided by the Department of Human Services at the May 2015 Caseload Estimating Conference.

Increase Intermodal Surface Transportation Fund – Individual and Family Support, Page 17 Line 34 by \$265,497, from \$4,162,981 to \$4,428,478. This increase aligns recommended financing for the Intermodal Surface Transportation account with the May 2015 estimate of the per penny gas tax yield, as provided by the Rhode Island Department of Revenue – Office of Revenue Analysis.

### **Behavioral Healthcare, Developmental Disabilities, and Hospitals**

Increase General Revenues - Services for the Developmentally Disabled, Page 19, Line 15 by \$2,000,000 million (no net change due to previous amendment related to the Reinventing Medicaid Act amendment). These funds will make a base adjustment to account for the annualization of a rate change in January of 2014.

Increase Federal Funds - Services for the Developmentally Disabled, Page 19, Line 16 by \$2,025,765 million (no net change due to previous amendment related to the Reinventing Medicaid Act amendment). These funds will make a base adjustment to account for the annualization of a rate change in January of 2014.

### **Elementary and Secondary Education**

Administration of the Comprehensive Education Strategy. Increase General Revenues, Page 20, line 18 by \$125,000, from \$21,231,893 to \$21,356,893. This amendment adds \$125,000 for federal monitor expenses that the Department may be required to pay, in relation to a possible violation of the Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 currently being investigated by the United States Department of Justice. The Department had indicated in its budget request that it did not expect any billings in FY 2016 - subsequent information indicates the need for at least \$125,000 in FY 2016.

Education Aid. Decrease General Revenues, Page 21, line 26 by \$340,560, from \$805,090,287 to \$804,749,727. This amendment reduces education aid by \$92,774 for various communities based on March, 2015 enrollment data. The March data update also reflects reduction of \$247,786 from full-day kindergarten provided in the Governor's recommendation, as two communities, Johnston and East Greenwich will implement full-day kindergarten in September, 2015. The savings are actually a shift to the education formula, as the Department includes the increased counts of school children, from half-day to full-day, in the formula calculation.

### **Public Higher Education**

Decrease Tuition Savings Program Administration Other Funds – Office of Postsecondary Commissioner Program, Page 22, Line 23 by \$424,560 from \$465,610 to \$41,050. This amendment transfers \$424,560 of Tuition Savings Program Administrative funding from the Office of Postsecondary Commissioner to the Office of the General Treasurer. Article 7 of the FY 2016 shifts administrative responsibility for the Tuition Savings Program, also known as the CollegeBoundfund, from the Rhode Island Higher Education Assistance Authority to Treasury. This amendment shifts financial resources to Treasury to fund the administrative costs the program.

Decrease Debt – URI Energy Conservation Other Funds in the University of Rhode Island Program, Page 23, Line 16, by \$810,170 from \$2,520,156 to \$1,709,986 and rename line to Debt – URI Unrestricted Energy Conservation, and insert Page 23, after Line 17 a new line entitled Debt - URI Restricted Energy Conservation Other Funds- \$810,170. This amendment creates a new line item in URI's budget for purposes of transparency to distinguish restricted budget and unrestricted budget energy conservation debt service payments. Restricted budget items are funded from self-supporting auxiliaries (non-tuition items), such as Housing, Bookstore,

and Parking. Unrestricted budget items are funded from tuition and state general revenue support.

#### **Attorney General**

Increase Restricted Receipt Funds, Page 26, Line 6 by \$6,000,000 from \$0 to \$6,000,000. The Department anticipates starting two new capital projects in FY 2016, funded solely from Google Forfeiture Funds (restricted receipts). Of the total recommended increase, \$5.0 million is intended to support the potential renovation of the Gloria McDonald building at the Pastore Center. The Department is considering acquiring this property to house certain divisions including the Bureau of Criminal Identification (BCI). If acquired, the Gloria McDonald building requires significant renovation, which would be funded solely through Google Forfeiture Funds. The remaining \$1.0 million would finance a redesign and renovation of office space in the Attorney General's main building at 150 South Main Street. Potential projects include building new office space within the existing structure and moving utilities such as HVAC.

#### **Judiciary**

Increase Supreme Court – Restricted Receipts, Page 28, Line 9 by \$940,500, from \$2,163,386 to \$3,103,886. In its FY 2016 request, the Judiciary did not include full expenditure for its case management system manager, Tyler Corporation, in its Technology Surcharge restricted receipt account. In subsequent communication, the Judiciary indicates that a total of \$1.12 million will be required, based on Judiciary's estimate of 64,000 cases to be filed at \$17.50 per case payable to Tyler Corporation. The Governor's proposed budget included \$180,000 as a placeholder – this amendment increases the appropriation level to \$1.12 million, which is adequate to pay the vendor for the budget year.

#### **Public Safety**

Increase State Fire Marshal – Federal Funds, Page 30, Line 3 by \$193,800, from \$202,285 to \$396,095. The State Fire Marshal's Office was awarded an Assistance Firefighters Grant after the Governor's original budget was submitted. These funds are awarded through the Department of Homeland Security's application process.

Increase Municipal Police Training Academy – Federal Funds, Page 30, Line 16 by \$21,334, from \$144,420 to \$165,754. The Municipal Police Training Academy receives Byrne grant funds in order to conduct trainings. The grant is used to pay instructors fees.

Increase State Police – Federal Funds – Page 30, Line 20 by \$202,581, from \$2,229,499 to \$2,432,080. This increase is a result of a grant that was never expended in prior years, however the grant has been extended and expenditures for the grant have been identified by the State Police.

## **Department of Environmental Management**

Increase General Revenues, Natural Resources, Page 31, Line 11 by \$592,049 from \$20,040,905 to \$20,632,954. These funds shift the facilities centralization of funding for personnel from the Department of Administration back to the Department of Environmental Management.

Increase Restricted Receipts- Natural Resources, Page 31, Line 13 by \$50,000 from \$6,460,768 to \$6,510,768. This increase makes an adjustment for estimated receipts assumed through the Local Agriculture and Seafood Fund based on Article 15, as amended, which proposes to earmark a share of the revenues received by the Coastal Resources Management Council for the lease of tidal lands for renewable energy projects.

## **Transportation**

Increase Infrastructure Engineering – Gasoline Tax, Page 32, Line 34 by \$2,341,882 from \$71,459,558 to \$73,801,440. The Governor recommends increasing the gasoline tax budget by \$2.3 million based on an updated estimate of the per penny gas tax yield provided by the Office of Revenue Analysis (ORA) in May. The ORA projects the gas tax yield to increase by \$153,566 in FY 2016, as compared to the Governor's original recommendation, for a revised per penny estimate of \$4,428,478. As a result, the Governor recommends an increase of \$1.5 million for the operating transfer of 9.75 cents allocated to the Rhode Island Public Transit Authority (RIPTA). The Governor recommends an increase of \$537,481 for the operating transfer of 3.50 cents allocated to the Rhode Island Turnpike and Bridge Authority. Additionally, the Governor recommends an increase of \$307,132 for the operating transfer of 2.00 cents allocated to fund debt service on the Motor Fuel Tax revenue bonds for the GARVEE program.

Increase Infrastructure Maintenance – Gasoline Tax, Page 33, Line 12 by \$2,649,014 from \$11,478,947 to \$14,127,961. The Governor recommends increasing the gasoline tax budget by \$2.6 million to reflect recent adjustments to the Motor Fuel Tax. Per a revised estimate of the per penny gas tax yield, the Office of Revenue Analysis projects the gas tax yield to increase by \$153,566 in FY 2016 as compared to the Governor's original recommendation, for a revised per penny estimate of \$4,428,478. Based on the Department receiving 17.25 pennies of the Motor Fuel Tax, the upward revision will provide the Department with additional gasoline tax revenue. Please note that the increase in gasoline tax revenues is offset by a slight decrease in the revenue estimates deposited into the Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account. This represents a net increase of \$2.6 million between the two funds comprising the state financed portion of the Department's budget, which is recommended to be added to the Department's state match towards the Federal Highway Program utilized for construction projects.

Decrease Infrastructure Maintenance – Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account, Page 33, Line 12 by \$75,751 from \$41,391,607 to \$41,315,856. The Governor recommends decreasing the Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account budget by \$75,751 to reflect recent adjustments to the various revenue sources deposited into the account. Per revised estimates, the Office of Revenue Analysis projects that revenues collected via Rental Car Surcharge Fees will decrease by \$75,751 based on historical revenue trends. Based on the revised estimate, the Rhode Island Public Transit Authority's five-percent share is reduced by \$3,787. Please note that the decrease in the Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account is offset by an increase in gasoline tax revenue. This represents a net increase of \$2.6 million between the two funds comprising the state financed portion of the Department's budget, which is recommended to be added to the Department's state match towards the Federal Highway Program utilized for construction projects.

#### SECTION 10, FY 2016 FTE POSITION AUTHORIZATION

Increase FTE Position Authorization, Page 36, Line 18 from 83.0 to 85.0: This increase reflects the Governor's intention to move the administration of the CollegeBoundfund® from the Rhode Island Higher Education Assistance Authority to the Office of the General Treasurer. Two new FTE positions are recommended for administration of the program at Treasury.

### ARTICLE 10, RELATING TO MAKING REVISED APPROPRIATIONS IN SUPPORT OF FY 2015

#### SECTION 1, REVISED APPROPRIATIONS IN SUPPORT OF FY 2015

##### **Department of Revenue**

Increase Federal Funds – Taxation, Page 132, Line 10 by \$1,397,500 from \$1,812,428 to \$3,209,928. The Department has received federal funding to provide direct assistance to qualifying fishery participants from the Groundfish Disaster Funding grant. This funding will support payments of \$32,500 to 43 eligible permit holders.

##### **General Treasurer**

Increase Restricted Receipts - Admin Expenses – State Retirement System, Page 134, Line 12 by \$700,000, from \$10,028,124 to \$10,728,124. This increase provides an additional \$550,000, for a total of \$1.6 million in the current year for special legal counsel, for the State's defense against pension reform lawsuits brought by employee groups. The mediation process which eliminated the requirement for a trial, nonetheless accelerated the requirement for legal defense in the current year above the \$1.0 million recommended in the Governor's original submission. The amendment also restores \$150,000 to accounting and audit submission.
