**Subject:** Amendment #3 to FY 2016 Appropriations Act (15-H-5900)

The Governor requests that several amendments be made to the FY 2016 Appropriations Act, which was submitted to the General Assembly on March 12, 2015. The amendments include changes to appropriation amounts in Article 1, Relating to Making Appropriations in Support of FY 2016, and Article 10, Relating to Making Revised Appropriations in Support of FY 2015. This amendment is in addition to amendments submitted May 13, 2015.

Decrease Infrastructure Maintenance – Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account, Page 33, Line 12 by \$75,751 from \$41,391,607 to \$41,315,856. The Governor recommends decreasing the Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account budget by \$75,751 to reflect recent adjustments to the various revenue sources deposited into the account. Per revised estimates, the Office of Revenue Analysis projects that revenues collected via Rental Car Surcharge Fees will decrease by \$75,751 based on historical revenue trends. Based on the revised estimate, the Rhode Island Public Transit Authority's five-percent share is reduced by \$3,787. Please note that the decrease in the Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account is offset by an increase in gasoline tax revenue. This represents a net increase of \$2.6 million between the two funds comprising the state financed portion of the Department's budget, which is recommended to be added to the Department's state match towards the Federal Highway Program utilized for construction projects.

#### SECTION 10, FY 2016 FTE POSITION AUTHORIZATION

Increase FTE Position Authorization, Page 36, Line 18 from 83.0 to 85.0: This increase reflects the Governor's intention to move the administration of the CollegeBoundfund® from the Rhode Island Higher Education Assistance Authority to the Office of the General Treasurer. Two new FTE positions are recommended for administration of the program at Treasury.

#### ARTICLE 10, RELATING TO MAKING REVISED APPROPRIATIONS IN SUPPORT OF FY 2015

##### SECTION 1, REVISED APPROPRIATIONS IN SUPPORT OF FY 2015

###### **Department of Revenue**

Increase Federal Funds – Taxation, Page 132, Line 10 by \$1,397,500 from \$1,812,428 to \$3,209,928. The Department has received federal funding to provide direct assistance to qualifying fishery participants from the Groundfish Disaster Funding grant. This funding will support payments of \$32,500 to 43 eligible permit holders.

###### **General Treasurer**

Increase Restricted Receipts - Admin Expenses – State Retirement System, Page 134, Line 12 by \$700,000, from \$10,028,124 to \$10,728,124. This increase provides an additional \$550,000, for a total of \$1.6 million in the current year for special legal counsel, for the State's defense against pension reform lawsuits brought by employee groups. The mediation process which eliminated the requirement for a trial, nonetheless accelerated the requirement for legal defense in the current year above the \$1.0 million recommended in the Governor's original submission. The amendment also restores \$150,000 to accounting and audit submission.

services, for a total of \$300,000, to complete a review of municipal retirement systems in the current year.

### **Commission for Human Rights**

Increase General Revenue, Page 135, Line 6 by \$10,010 from \$1,221,763 to \$1,231,773. The increase represents the Commission recently receiving a letter from their landlord, Capstone Properties, indicating that while completing the 2014 Real Estate Reconciliation; it came to their attention that the Commission had not been billed for their proportional share of Real Estate Taxes for the years 2011 through 2013. They will also be responsible for paying the 2014 taxes. The payment of a share of the real estate tax is consistent with the lease approved by the State Properties Commission back in 2001. The Commission leases building space in Providence in which their office works out of.

### **Department of Children, Youth, and Families**

Increase General Revenues – Child Welfare, Page 137 Line 3 by \$1,930,239, from \$113,906,696 to \$115,836,935. This increase aligns recommended financing for foster care, day care, and other services outside the system of care with projections provided in the Department's third quarter report.

### **Department of Health**

Increase Federal Funds – Environmental and Health Services Regulation, Page 137, Line 31, by \$2,642,849 from \$5,703,307 to \$8,346,156. This increase shifts funds previously budgeted under the restricted receipt account State Revolving Fund Administration to a federal funds account in accordance with federal reporting requirements.

Decrease Restricted Receipts – Environmental and Health Services Regulation, Page 137, Line 32 by \$2,642,849 from \$3,645,856 to \$1,003,007. This decrease shifts funds budgeted within the restricted receipt account State Revolving Fund Administration to a federal funds account in accordance with federal reporting requirements.

### **Department of Human Services**

Increase General Revenues – Individual and Family Support, Page 138 Line 34 by \$707,264, from \$23,320,823 to \$24,028,087. This increase is the result of two upward adjustments in recommended general revenue financing in this program. First, the increase reflects an additional \$683,350 attributable to a FFY 2013 Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program penalty that is anticipated to be accrued to SFY 2015. This is combined with an additional \$23,914 to bring recommended financing for the additional \$206 monthly assisted living payment for individuals residing in non-Medicaid funded assisted living facilities and

assisted living facilities financed by the Rhode Island Housing and Mortgage Finance Corporation to \$359,198 in FY 2015, consistent with testimony provided by the Department of Human Services at the May 2015 Caseload Estimating Conference.

Increase Intermodal Surface Transportation Fund – Individual and Family Support, Page 139 Line 7 by \$234,842, from \$4,162,981 to \$4,397,823. This increase aligns recommended financing for the Intermodal Surface Transportation account with the May 2015 estimate of the per penny gas tax yield, as provided by the Rhode Island Department of Revenue – Office of Revenue Analysis.

### **Behavioral Healthcare, Developmental Disabilities, and Hospitals**

Increase General Revenues - Services for the Developmentally Disabled, Page 140, Line 23, by \$4,240,401 from \$111,739,502 to \$115,979,903. This increase is related to the restoration of \$340,401, which is associated with the implementation of the Electronic Visit Verification system and was anticipated to begin on April 1, 2015. Due to delays with the implementation process, this system will not be in place until FY 2016. This increase also includes an additional \$3,900,000 to account for the annualization of a rate adjustment that took place in January of 2014 and an expanded caseload related to the implementation of the Consent Decree.

Increase Federal Funds - Services for the Developmentally Disabled, Page 140, Line 24, by \$4,245,494 from \$ 111,990,007 to \$116,235,501. This increase is related to the restoration of \$340,810, which is associated with the implementation of the Electronic Visit Verification system and was anticipated to begin on April 1, 2015. Due to delays with the implementation process, this system will not be in place until FY 2016. This increase also includes an additional \$3,904,684 to account for the annualization of a rate adjustment that took place in January of 2014 and an expanded caseload related to the implementation of the Consent Decree.

Increase General Revenues – Hospital and Community Rehabilitative Services, Page 141, Line 13 by \$240,000 from \$51,314,795 to \$51,554,795. This increase provides additional funding for overtime expenditures related to Blizzard Juno.

Increase Federal Funds – Hospital and Community Rehabilitative Services, Page 141, Line 14 by \$240,288 from \$51,484,391 to \$51,724,679. This increase provides additional funding for overtime expenditures related to Blizzard Juno.

### **Public Higher Education**

Decrease Debt – URI Energy Conservation Other Funds in the University of Rhode Island Program, Page 145, Line 3, by \$791,071 from \$2,460,718 to \$1,669,647 and rename line to Debt – URI Unrestricted Energy Conservation, and insert Page 145,

after Line 3 a new line entitled Debt - URI Restricted Energy Conservation Other Funds- \$791,071. This amendment creates a new line item in URI's budget for purposes of transparency to distinguish restricted budget and unrestricted budget energy conservation debt service payments. Restricted budget items are funded from self-supporting auxiliaries (non-tuition items), such as Housing, Bookstore, and Parking. Unrestricted budget items are funded from tuition and state general revenue support.

### Judiciary

Increase Supreme Court – Restricted Receipts, Page 150, Line 8 by \$473,625, from \$3,262,344 to \$3,735,969. In its FY 2015 revised request, the Judiciary did not include full expenditure for its case management system manager, Tyler Corporation. In subsequent communication, the Judiciary indicates that a total of \$653,625 will be required, based on Judiciary's estimate of 37,350 cases to be filed at \$17.50 per case payable to Tyler Corporation. The enacted budget included \$180,000 as a placeholder – this amendment provides an appropriation level of \$653,625, which is adequate to pay the vendor for the current year.

### Public Safety

Increase Central Management – Federal Funds, Page 151, Line 23, by \$82,872, from \$3,985,600 to \$4,068,472. This increase is for federal grant awards utilized to cover significant personnel costs within the Grants Administration Office.

Increase Municipal Police Training Academy – Federal Funds, Page 152, Line 9 by \$28,000, from \$209,620 to \$237,620. The Municipal Police Training Academy receives Byrne grant funds in order to conduct trainings. The grant is used to pay instructors fees.

Increase State Police – Federal Funds – Page 152, Line 13 by \$50,619, from \$3,180,834 to \$3,231,453. This increase is a result of a grant that was never expended in prior years, however the grant has been extended and expenditures for the grant have been identified by the State Police.

### Transportation

Increase Central Management – Federal Funds, Page 154, Line 18 by \$3,660,000 from \$9,040,000 to \$12,700,000. The Governor recommends increasing federal funds in the Central Management Program by \$3.7 million for new and additional federal National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) grant awards the Department has received. Grant funding will be used for child safety, motorcycle safety, primary seatbelt safety and alcohol impaired driving programs.

Increase Infrastructure Engineering – Federal Funds, Page 154, Line 27 by \$35,000,000 from \$252,186,313 to \$287,186,313. The Governor recommends

increasing federal funds in the Infrastructure Engineering Program by \$35.0 million. The increase is related to the Department's Federal Highway Program, which was conservatively estimated when the Governor's budget recommendation was submitted. Since that time, the Department has been able to continually be reimbursed by the Federal Highway Administration for ongoing projects and is ramping up its construction season. Prior to the submission, there had been some unknowns based on the looming shortfall in the Federal Highway Trust fund which has since been extended another two months (previously scheduled to expire May 31, 2015).

Increase Infrastructure Engineering – Restricted Receipts, Page 154, Line 31 by \$1,250,000 from \$1,000,000 to \$2,250,000. The Governor recommends increasing restricted receipts in the Infrastructure Engineering Program by \$1.3 million for the Department's "Third Party" account used to process invoices and purchase orders related to certain projects.

Increase Infrastructure Engineering – Gasoline Tax, Page 154, Line 33 by \$1,505,541 from \$71,396,434 to \$72,901,975. The Governor recommends increasing the gasoline tax budget by \$1.5 million based on an updated estimate of the per penny gas tax yield provided by the Office of Revenue Analysis (ORA) in May. The ORA projects the gas tax yield to increase by \$98,724 in FY 2015, as compared to the Governor's original recommendation, for a revised per penny estimate of \$4,397,823. As a result, the Governor recommends an increase of \$962,559 for the operating transfer of 9.75 cents allocated to the Rhode Island Public Transit Authority (RIPTA). The Governor recommends an increase of \$345,534 for the operating transfer of 3.50 cents allocated to the Rhode Island Turnpike and Bridge Authority. Additionally, the Governor recommends an increase of \$197,448 for the operating transfer of 2.00 cents allocated to fund debt service on the Motor Fuel Tax revenue bonds for the GARVEE program.

Increase Infrastructure Maintenance – Gasoline Tax, Page 155, Line 9 by \$1,560,761 from \$13,973,118 to \$15,533,879. The Governor recommends increasing the gasoline tax budget by \$1.6 million to reflect recent adjustments to the Motor Fuel Tax. Per a revised estimate of the per penny gas tax yield, the Office of Revenue Analysis projects the gas tax yield to increase by \$98,724 in FY 2015 as compared to the Governor's original recommendation, for a revised per penny estimate of \$4,397,823. Based on the Department receiving 16.25 pennies of the Motor Fuel Tax, the upward revision will provide the Department with additional gasoline tax revenue. Please note that the increase in gasoline tax revenues is offset by a decrease in the revenue estimates deposited into the Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account. This represents a net increase of \$98,855 between the two funds comprising the state financed portion of the Department's budget, which is recommended to be added to the Department's winter maintenance budget, which has experienced sever shortfalls based on a long, drawn out winter.

Decrease Infrastructure Maintenance – Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account, Page 155, Line 12 by \$1,461,906 from \$35,034,115 to \$33,572,209. The Governor recommends decreasing the Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account budget by \$1.5 million to reflect recent adjustments to the various revenue sources deposited into the account. Per revised estimates, the Office of Revenue Analysis projects that revenues collected via Emission Inspection Sticker fees will decrease by \$1.7 million based on year-to-date cash collections. The decrease is offset slightly by an increase of \$214,755 in Motor Vehicle Title Fees and an increase of \$39,672 in Rental Car Surcharge Fees. Please note that the decrease in the Rhode Island Highway Maintenance Account is offset by an increase in gasoline tax revenue. This represents a net increase of \$98,855 between the two funds comprising the state financed portion of the Department's budget, which is recommended to be added to the Department's winter maintenance budget, which has experienced sever shortfalls based on a long, drawn out winter.
