2006 Legislative Accomplishments

TAX RELIEF

- The state budget continues the **auto excise tax phase-out**, hiking the state's share of the tax payments from \$5,000 to the first \$6,000 valuation of each car.
- The state budget includes an increase in the "circuit breaker" tax credit from \$250 to \$300 for elderly and/or disabled homeowners with a household income of \$30,000 or less.
- The Assembly passed legislation to **ease local property taxes** by gradually reducing a community's tax levy cap and establishing a cap on school budgets and by eliminating unfunded mandates.
- The budget includes a provision to **reduce Rhode Island's highest marginal tax** rate to make Rhode Island more competitive with other states.
- The budget includes an increase from 10 percent to 15 percent for the refundable **Earned Income Tax Credit**, which is a tax reduction and wage supplement for low- and moderate-income working families.
- The budget includes approximately \$1 million for an **airport impact fund** to be distributed to communities that house a state airport, with \$822,000 for Warwick and the remainder to be shared by Westerly, Newport, New Shoreham, North Kingstown, Lincoln and Smithfield.

HOUSING

- The state budget contains a \$50 million **housing bond referendum** that will go toward building affordable housing if voters approve it in November.
- The state budget contains \$7.5 million for the **Neighborhood Opportunities Program**, which builds affordable housing for the disabled and disadvantaged.
- The non-profit Rhode Island Housing and Mortgage Finance Corporation will have the first option to purchase homes put up for tax sale to prevent situations like that of Madeline Walker, the elderly Providence woman evicted from her home over a \$500 sewer bill.
- Rhode Island Home Loan Protection Act will protect borrowers from
 predatory mortgage lending practices. It was the result of an Assembly
 commission that conducted an investigation of the effects of predatory mortgage
 lending on the state.

- The Assembly amended the **Affordable Housing Preservation Act**, to prevent the loss of Section 8 housing to private development.
- The Assembly increased from \$200,000 to \$300,000 the **homestead exemption** in state law a provision that protects homeowners from judgments that could otherwise cost them their homes or inhibit their ability to sell the property.

EDUCATION

- The budget includes a **4.8-percent increase in State Aid to Education** to every school district.
- The Assembly passed legislation aimed at cutting local school costs by getting school districts to pool their purchasing power for such items as office supplies, textbooks and general insurance products.
- Legislation passed by the Assembly establishes guidelines for the sale of **healthy snacks and beverages in schools**, promoting the sale of water and fruit juice instead of sugar-sweetened drinks and promoting snacks that are high in nutritional value and low in fat, salt and added sugar.
- The budget provides a mechanism for business **tax credits for entities that make contributions to tuition** assistance for non-public K-12 students from households with an annual income not more than 250 percent of the federal poverty level.
- The budget restores \$6.8 million for **asset protection projects** efforts to maintain buildings to keep them useful and prevent deterioration for the three public higher education institutions, funding that was not in the governor's budget. It also includes \$1.2 million to complete the Independence Hall renovation project at the University of Rhode Island.
- The budget contains \$200,000 to support the implementation of a statewide science curriculum in kindergarten through Grade 12, \$250,000 to provide physics textbooks and lab equipment for high schools participating in the Physics First program, and \$300,000 for professional development activities in mathematics and science throughout elementary and secondary education.
- The Assembly approved two **higher education bond issues** to be placed before the voters in November. This includes a \$65 million project at URI to construct a new School of Pharmacy building and \$7.8 million at Rhode Island College to complete renovations of the former DCYF facilities.

HEALTH CARE

- As part of the work of the Joint Committee on Health Care Oversight, the Assembly passed a six-bill **Health Insurance Affordability Act** designed to address the affordability of health insurance for individuals and small employers.
- The Assembly voted to override the governor's veto of last year's bill legalizing the **medical use of marijuana**.
- The Department of Human Services will issue a report on large companies whose **employees are forced to use public health insurance** programs because they are not offered affordable health insurance at work.
- The Assembly passed a first-in-the-nation initiative to create a central purchasing and dispensing **program for adult flu vaccine**, similar to the state's childhood vaccination program.
- The budget passed by the Assembly reinstated cuts that the governor made that would have knocked 6,800 parents and 2,400 children off the **RIte Care** insurance rolls.
- Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Rhode Island will be allowed to sell other insurance products so that the nonprofit insurer can keep its health insurance premiums as low as possible.
- The Assembly voted to require health insurers to cover **smoking cessation treatment**.
- A bill approved by the Assembly increases the minimum coverage insurers must provide for **hearing aids**.

PUBLIC SAFETY

- A measure has taken effect to reduce drunken driving by strengthening penalties on people who refuse to take breath tests. The legislation doubles the infractions for first-time offenders and makes second and third refusals a criminal offense rather than the current misdemeanor.
- The "Jessica Lunsford Child Predator Act of 2006" has been signed into law and gives law enforcement more tools to monitor sexual predators, including requiring them to wear electronic monitoring devices.
- Adults who allow underage drinking parties to be held in their homes will be held criminally responsible, under the so-called "Social Host" bill.
- Minors will be prohibited from using a cell phone or hands free device while operating a motor vehicle.

- Legislation was passed to expand on a law adopted last year to increase protection for consumers against **identity theft.**
- The state will be required to develop separate fire codes for places of worship so that churches will not necessarily be required to install sprinklers.
- Any individual leaving the premises of a gas station without paying for their gas will be guilty of larceny. The measure was passed to acknowledge the high cost of gas and the loss being incurred by gas station owners as a result of gas theft.
- Any individual who has **registered as a sex offender in another state** or jurisdiction and moves to Rhode Island must also register here.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- The Assembly passed the **Biotechnology Jobs Growth Act** to attract biotechnology and biomanufacturing firms to Rhode Island by means of a tax credit program. Amgen announced 450 additional jobs as a result of this legislation.
- The legislature approved a constitutional amendment referendum to go before voters in November, passage of which would allow the construction of a **resort casino** in West Warwick.
- The budget includes \$200,000 for funding of a **Science and Technology Council** to finance specific initiatives focused on improving the business climate in Rhode Island and promoting the science and business sector.
- Updates were made to the state's **film and television tax credit program**, which directly resulted in the filming of several movies and two television series entirely within Rhode Island this year.
- The budget includes \$1.5 million for participation in the National Science Foundation's Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCor).

ENVIRONMENT

- Consumers and businesses will save money as a result of legislation that **sets minimum energy standards** for new sales of several commercial and residential appliances.
- A measure aimed at reducing air pollution will prohibit operators of diesel engines from allowing those **engines to idle for more than five consecutive minutes.**

• The Electronic Waste Prevention, Reuse and Recycling Act will provide a comprehensive system to regulate electronic waste and protect the environment and the health and safety of all Rhode Islanders.

CONSUMER/QUALITY OF LIFE

- A **comprehensive energy bill** that provides a mechanism to address the state's long-term energy needs and costs and that addresses the plight of low-income households in the face of rising heating costs was passed by the Assembly and has since been signed into law.
- Legislation to increase the **minimum wage** in Rhode Island from \$6.75 to \$7.10 in March 2006 and to \$7.40 in January 2007 was enacted into law.
- The budget includes funding to **keep all the Division of Motor Vehicle branch offices open**. The Governor's budget recommended closing the offices in West Warwick, Wakefield, Woonsocket, Warwick, Westerly, Middletown and Warren.
- The **registration of contractors** in Rhode Island will now be regulated as a result of the work of a special House commission that has been studying the issue and will make further recommendations in the 2007 session.
- Rhode Islanders will be allowed to take home unfinished bottles of wine from restaurants, under the so-called **Merlot-to-go** bill.
- A mandatory spay/neuter program for cats has been signed into law, making Rhode Island the first in the nation to address cat population control on a statewide basis.
- Video lottery terminal winnings will be withheld from individuals in arrears on their child support payments. The legislation will apply to any individual with child support arrearages of more than \$500, if the winnings exceed the federal tax reporting limit of \$1,199.
- Selling or buying telephone records without the phone customer's express consent will be considered a criminal offense.
- An **updated motor scooter law** has taken effect, ensuring that today's more powerful scooters are addressed in state moped laws and that their riders are not forced to get motorcycle licenses.

GOOD GOVERNMENT

• The Assembly continued reconstituting state boards and commissions to comply with the **separation of powers** constitutional amendment passed by voters in

2004.

- The Assembly approved a statute that will be necessary if voters in November approve a ballot question allowing the **reinstatement of voting rights** to people who are serving probation or parole for a felony.
- More transparent reporting by public officials will be required to **promote** accountability and public confidence in government.
- The Assembly overrode the governor's veto of a bill designed to **open to public** view government service contracts worth \$100,000 or more with non-governmental individuals or agencies.
- School Committees may add items to their agendas, for discussion purposes only, when asked to do so in writing by a member of the public during the public comment section of a meeting.
- To increase voter participation, the Assembly approved a measure allowing 16-and 17-year-olds to **pre-register to vote**, so they will automatically be registered on their 18th birthdays.
- There will now be specific rules governing **reporting requirements** for people and groups who advocate for or against ballot questions.

MILITARY/VETERANS

- There will be an increase, from \$250,000 to \$400,000, in the state-funded life insurance for every active-duty member of the Rhode Island National Guard.
- A commission was convened to study the future of the **Rhode Island Veterans' Home** in Bristol.
- February 16 of each year will be Gold Star Parents Day in Rhode Island.
- The legislation requires that a veteran's funeral will include a bugler playing "Taps" live.
