Re: Governor's FY 2027, vis a vis the Department of Health

Dear Chair DiPalma and members of the Committee,

We are writing today regarding the Department of Health's FY27 budget and the important need to adequately fund the state's home visiting programs. **We urge you to make sure that Rhode Island meets the state funding matching requirements (\$787,000 in state matching funds to bring in \$2.4 million) for the federal Maternal Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) funds** so that high-quality programs, such as Healthy Families America and Parents as Teachers, are offered to all families who could benefit.

For over 190 years, we at Children's Friend have worked to advance the well-being and healthy development of the youngest and most vulnerable children in Rhode Island. Today, alongside our permanency, nutrition services, child care, Head Start and Pre-K programs, we serve 354 in our Healthy Families America program which is funded by MIECHV. Last year we closed our Nurse Family Partnership home visiting program because we could not sustain the program with the current funding model.

Despite the important role that home visiting programs play in ensuring families and young children start off on the right foot, since 2021 the number of families in Rhode Island receiving family home visiting services has declined by thirty-two percent (32%) due to staffing shortages and funding challenges; and 9 programs have closed. Rhode Island needs to be doing more to ensure we are maximizing federal funding to stabilize these programs.

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Unfortunately, Rhode Island has been leaving federal funds on the table. In FY24, Rhode Island was 1 of 4 states that didn't get the full match. In FY25, Rhode Island was 1 of 7 states that didn't get the full match. (see the fact sheet on page 2)

Last year, Rhode Island only put in \$56,000 of the \$356,000 required match amount to draw down the maximum 3:1 federal match. This meant they left \$900,000 on the table that went to another state instead.

The RI Department of Health has been able to find \$409,765 in matching funds to secure \$1,229,295 in available federal MIECHV funds in federal fiscal year 2026. This is a partial match. \$543,031 was the target state match, so Rhode Island is missing \$133,266 in state funds and forfeiting \$399,798 in available federal funds.

For FY27, the challenge match required will be even higher as will the federal funding available for Rhode Island – it is estimated the state will need \$787,000 to secure \$2.4 million in available federal MICEHV funds.

This relatively small investment is not included in the Governor's proposed FY27 budget request.

We urge you to require RIDOH secure the full match amount for FY27 to ensure we can fully meet the federal match. We also hope you will work to guarantee that RIDOH allocates these federal funds in a flexible way to support the current families and communities these programs serve.

UNDERSTANDING THE MIECHV FUNDING FORMULA

Beginning in Federal Fiscal Year 2024, states have the opportunity to secure additional funding for Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Programs. To be eligible, states must designate general funds to support evidence-based home visiting initiatives. In return, the federal government will provide a matching amount of \$3 for every \$1 contributed by the state annually, up to a limit determined by each state's population data.
