Dear Chairman DiPalma,

I write to express my strong support for Question 1 that will allocate \$215,000,000 to Rhode Island's institutions of higher education.

- Expand access to academic resources. Renovations to the *Adams Library at Rhode Island College* will provide students with a modern student success and career readiness center for academic advising, employer engagement, and learning resources in one central location.

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Rhode Island's state institutions of higher education exemplify a shared commitment to providing students with access to cutting-edge research, hands-on learning opportunities, and high-quality teaching. From the University of Rhode Island's achievement of the prestigious R1 Carnegie Classification to Rhode Island College's launch of the Institute for Cybersecurity & Emerging Technologies, we are witnessing a powerful transformation of these institutions into modern academic centers—driven by forward-thinking leadership, whose efforts are reshaping the schools to meet the demands of the future.

It is imperative the state continues to maintain this momentum by investing in these. Such an investment supports the students currently enrolled, those yet to come, and the long-term economic strength and competitiveness of the state.
