



Testimony Re: Senate Bill 2844

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony today. Rhode Island KIDS COUNT would like to voice its opposition to Senate Bill 2844. This bill would exempt “flavored nicotine-delivery systems” shops from the flavored nicotine-delivery system ban, allowing flavored nicotine products to be sold in Rhode Island despite the ban on flavored electronic cigarettes.

While there has been a decline in current e-cigarette use among U.S. high school students, from 10% in 2023 to 7.8% in 2024, flavored electronic nicotine-delivery systems (ENDS) remain the most popular product for youth use. Among Rhode Island youth who currently use e-cigarettes (also known as vapes or ENDS), 95% use flavored products.

Nearly 2,000 Rhode Islanders’ deaths every year are attributable to smoking and tobacco use and preventing young people from beginning to smoke protects their developing adolescent brains from nicotine’s harmful effects on attention, learning, mood, and impulse control. **E-cigarettes are often proposed as a way to help people quit smoking, but flavored e-cigarettes are the way that many young people *begin* smoking.** There is no e-cigarette currently approved by the FDA to help people quit smoking. The sale of flavored e-cigarettes has been banned since then-Governor Gina Raimondo’s executive order in 2019, which was codified into law and took effect January 1st, 2025. Exempting “electronic nicotine-delivery system” shops threatens to erode the progress made in protecting our youth from the harms of e-cigarette use.

Thank you for the leadership that the General Assembly has shown on this issue in the past. We urge you to vote against Senate Bill 2844 and uphold the ban on flavored e-cigarettes statewide.
