Re: Support for Senate Bill 2460 RELATING TO INSURANCE -- ACCIDENT AND INSURANCE POLICIES

Dear Members of the Senate Committee on Health and Human Services,

I am submitting testimony on behalf of the RI Coalition for Reproductive Freedom in support of Senate Bill 2460. Our Coalition, made up of 29 member organizations, works together to share resources, build strategies and coordinate efforts to connect reproductive freedom with social and economic justice. We recognize real inequalities in our state and we envision a RI where everyone has access to affordable and comprehensive reproductive health care. This current bill seeks to address a fundamental inequality regarding fertility healthcare.

I know quite a few people—as I'm sure you do as well—who have struggled to build their desperately wanted family. Current RI law doesn't require private insurers to cover fertility healthcare for ALL Rhode Islanders. The actual population seeking to create a family via fertility treatment includes single people and LGBTQ+ families, who are excluded as the law is currently written. The number of people who have experienced fertility issues is high: about 9% of men and 11% of women (and Black women are nearly twice as likely to experience infertility). Paying out of pocket is not an option for most people--nor should it be since the restrictions on who has access to fertility treatment is arbitrary.

Our Coalition believes that every single individual should have access to the care they need in order to build their family—how and when they want to. This is the true expression of the freedom we promote. I ask that you vote for ALL Rhode Islanders and pass S 2460.
