**Re: Support for Senate Bill 2467 - Ban Prior Authorization**

Dear Chairwoman Murray and Members of the Committee:

The Mental Health Association of Rhode Island (MhARI) is pleased to express our strong support for **Senate Bill 2467**, which would eliminate prior authorization requirements for in-network mental health and substance use disorder treatment. We thank **Senator Ujifusa** for advancing this important legislation.

Prior authorization requirements often create significant barriers to timely behavioral health care. Under these policies, providers must obtain approval from a health insurer before delivering treatment in order to ensure coverage. In practice, this process can delay or prevent access to care, even when a provider has determined that treatment is medically necessary.

Mental health and substance use disorders are conditions where **timely intervention is critical**. When people are unable to access care promptly, symptoms can worsen, sometimes leading to emergency department visits, hospitalizations, or involvement with the criminal legal system. Eliminating prior authorization requirements would help ensure that Rhode Islanders can receive treatment when they need it most.

Removing prior authorization requirements also reduces administrative burden for behavioral health providers. Clinicians spend significant time navigating complex insurance authorization systems instead of providing care to patients instead of providing care. Reducing these barriers can help address provider burnout and encourage more clinicians to remain in insurance networks, improving access to care statewide.

Rhode Island already has evidence that this policy can work. In 2019, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Rhode Island eliminated prior authorization requirements for in-network behavioral health services. This legislation would ensure that all Rhode Islanders—regardless of their insurance plan—have the same timely access to care.
