RE: Support for S3066 and S3065 – Children’s Mobile Response and Stabilization Services (MRSS)

Good afternoon, Chairwoman Murray and members of the Committee:

My name is Kimberly Luca, and I am a Principal at Villa Nova Middle School in Woonsocket, Rhode Island. I am writing in strong support of S3066 and S3065, as these bills are critical to ensuring that students and families have access to timely and effective behavioral health crisis support.

In schools, we regularly see students in behavioral health crisis, and too often, our only options are emergency services or the emergency room. These responses are not always appropriate and can disrupt a child’s education.

Mobile Response and Stabilization Services (MRSS) provide a better solution—offering immediate, community-based support that helps stabilize students and keep them engaged in school.

S3066 is critical because it ensures these services are available to all students, regardless of insurance. Schools don’t see coverage—we see children who need help. S3065 strengthens the system so we can rely on consistent, timely support.

Without access to MRSS, crises escalate, impacting not only the student but the entire school environment. These bills are essential to supporting student well-being, school stability, and long-term success.

When behavioral health crises are not addressed promptly, the impact extends beyond the individual student—it affects classroom environments, school safety, staff capacity, and overall school climate. Investing in MRSS is not only an investment in children’s behavioral health, but also in their education and long-term success.

I respectfully urge you to support S3066 and S3065 to ensure that Rhode Island’s children, families, and schools have access to a reliable, equitable, and effective crisis response system.
