**RE: Warwick Board of Canvassers Support for S-2130 (All write-ins posted with official results)**

Dear Chairman LaMountain and Hon. Members of the Senate Committee on Judiciary:

I am writing on behalf of the Warwick Board of Canvassers in strong support of **S-2130**, which makes important revisions to the write-in candidate declaration and tabulation process.

This bill is supported by **unanimous** votes of the RI Town and City Clerks' Association and the RI Board of Elections, and also by the RI League of Cities and Towns, among other organizations and local election offices. Similar attempts to reform Rhode Island's highly irregular write-in tabulation requirements and lack of declaration process have previously passed the House of Representatives *four* times.

There were 4,295 write-in votes cast in Warwick alone for the 2024 Presidential Election. The Warwick Board of Canvassers and staff worked for weeks to handwrite and hand-rewrite the 4,295 submissions on to several tabulation sheets several times over, literally causing blisters. Currently, write-in votes are counted and posted by the Board of Elections on their website, *and* the local Board must count and recount, and handwrite and re-handwrite all of the same results.

**S-2130** requires all write-in votes cast by voters in every race – even if frivolous or for fictional characters – to be scanned and posted on the state Board of Elections' website as part of official election results. This way, all Rhode Islanders can view the actual write-in vote cast by every voter, in every contest.

The act further requires local boards of canvassers to meet in a public meeting and adjudicate individual write-ins – in other words, determine the voter's intent – in **any** race in which the total number of write-ins cast may affect the outcome. Is it a valuable use of public time and resources for a local board to determine whether or not "Mickey Mouse" and "Mickey A. Mouse" should both be attributed to the same fictional character? In most cases, no – but we agree that said vote should still count, and still be published as part of official results. And, in cases where the total write-ins cast in a contest may affect the election outcome, the local board would, in fact, have to meet publicly and make that individual determination for *each and every* write-in vote cast.
