I want to share my story: without Same Day Voter Registration I would have been disenfranchised.

When I was in my 20s I moved frequently. This was in Minnesota, a state that had, and still has, Same Day Voter Registration. Shortly after one of those moves, there was an election. I arrived at the polls with the required documentation. I was able to register, and I was able to vote on that day. Without that provision, I would not have been able to vote.

I have served as Pollworker in Providence since 2020. I've seen the discouragement on people's faces when they show up to the polls and are turned away for not being registered. Often times these are first time voters, excited to participate in our representative democracy, often passionate about a candidate, but they didn't understand the archaic timeline our registration laws.

Isn't civic participation to the benefit of all? Why would we want to depress voter participation?

I urge you to support S-2132/Same Day Voter Registration.
