RE: S-2132 SUPPORT SAME DAY REGISTRATION RESOLUTION

Women's Fund of Rhode Island strongly supports S-2132, which allows same-day voter registration options for qualified Rhode Islanders. This already exists for Presidential elections, but for all local elections, Rhode Island requires a 30-day voter registration window. This requirement makes us an outlier in New England, when VT, ME, NH, and CT allow same-day voter registration for all elections.

The right to vote is the cornerstone of representative democracy. Due to the role women play in their families and communities, we bring a unique and valuable perspective to policymaking and the political process. We need the support of our legislators to help working women, caregivers, and our vulnerable population with varying health conditions, exercise their right to vote.

21 states plus the District of Columbia currently allow voter registration with proper identification on election day. Same day voter registration has also been shown to increase voter turnout, particularly for youth and voters of color.

Same Day Voter registration can fix voter inaccuracies in real time, with eligible voters correcting any inaccuracies and updating their voter information in front of each local board of canvassers. An example of where this might happen is when a voter moves into a new election district after the registration deadline has passed. Same day registration can make having provisional ballots less necessary; saving the taxpayers monies.

Eliminating arbitrary registration deadlines helps voters and prospective voters participate in the election process. The Women's Fund of Rhode Island urges our legislators to pass this important bill into law.
