**RE: Senate Bill #2141: An Act Relating to Courts and Civil Procedure – Procedure Generally – Fees**

Dear Chairman LaMountain:

I write on behalf of the Rhode Island Judiciary to express the Judiciary's concerns regarding Senate Bill # 2141, scheduled to be heard this evening before the Senate Committee on Judiciary. If enacted, this bill would increase the daily fee paid to jurors from \$25.00 to \$50.00 commencing July 1, 2026.

The Judiciary recognizes that jurors, while fulfilling their historically vital role in the fair and efficient administration of justice in this state, experience some disruption to their daily lives including work-related matters, travel, and other costs associated with jury service. Providing a mandated rate for each day's attendance goes some way towards compensating jurors for these costs. The Judiciary acknowledges the benefit to jurors of potentially increasing the daily rate for the first time in years.


However, the proposed increase would double the cost to the Judiciary. The Judiciary's budget does not currently have the funding to accommodate this financial increase. This bill as currently written does not make any provisions for additional funding to the Judiciary to pay for the one hundred (100%) daily rate increase envisioned by this legislation. Based on the attached fiscal impact statement, if the proposed daily rate increase is passed, it would cost the Judiciary approximately one million dollars per year, which is a significant impact to the Judiciary's budget.

The Judiciary has no room in its annual budget to absorb such costs. Implementing this increase without providing the Judiciary with an infusion of matching funding would likely require painful cuts to vital Judiciary programs and undermine the overall administration of justice. The Judiciary understands the intention behind this legislation, but requests additional funding to meet the goals of this legislation.

Should this bill move forward, the Judiciary requests that its FY 2027 budget be increased to meet the financial requirements of this legislation, so that the Judiciary can accommodate the financial increase suggested by this proposed legislation.

Thank you for the opportunity to express the Judiciary's financial concerns about this bill.
